After having tried for several weeks to come up with a bus policy delicately balanced between service to students and financial costs, the York County Board of Education at its May 12 meeting finally adopted a policy concerning pupil transportation.

The trustees agreed the maximum distance a pupil should walk should vary with the age of the child and also that there is a maximum length of time a child should be expected to spend on a bus.

Accordingly, kindergarten children living more than three quarters of a mile from school will be transported; pupils from grades 1 to 6 will be transported if they live over a mile from school. Children from kindergarten to grade 6 should not be expected to spend more than three quarters of an hour on a school bus and any pick-up before 8 am will be exceptional.

Students in grades 7 to 13 will be entitled to bus transportation if they live more than two miles from school and should not be expected to spend more than an hour on the bus. Any pick-up before 7:45 am would be exceptional. It was noted that the two mile provision for grades 7 to 13 assumes that there will be facilities for students to lunch at school.

Students will be issued bus privilege cards and these may be suggested at the discretion of the school principal if there are discipline problems. Bus drivers are to be responsible for conduct on buses and will report discipline problems promptly to the principals.

Where students can conveniently use public transportation, tickets or reimbursement for tickets will be supplied rather than transportation by school bus.
