### New CNR Marshalling Yards Open At Oshawa

Canadian National Railways last week opened its new \$2,500,000 freight marshalling yard in Oshawa to better serve the Oshawa-Whitby area industry. ### Defers Decision On Cable TV Requests

Vaughan Township Council has received two letters from Rogers Cable TV recently, it was reported at its June 3 meeting.

The first, addressed to Reeve Garnet Williams, asked permission to install facilities for recording and broadcasting council sessions on its cable system. The second letter contained a request for permission to make attachments to Vaughan hydro poles and to erect a cable between Highway 50 and Woodbridge on Highway 7, for the sole purpose of serving residents of Woodbridge.

Since at a CRTC hearing in May it was implied that licence awards for cable TV would be made by June 10, council decided to hold over consideration of both requests until the licence awards are made.

### Woodbridge '69 Taxes Up \$53 Average Home

Ratepayers in the Village of Woodbridge face a tax increase this year ranging up to 11.75 per cent. Residential owners who are public school supporters will pay 91.24 mills, an increase of 10.62 mills. This means an increase of \$53 on a house assessed at \$5,000.

Separate school rate on residential property is up 9.46 mills to a total of 97.58 mills. This means an increase in the tax bill of \$47.30 on a house assessed at \$5,000.

The increased tax demand comes mainly from education. Public school levies are up 5.92 mills, separate school levies are up 4.76 mills and secondary school levies are up 4.02 mills. The county rate is down .95 mills and general government is down 1.85 mills. The debenture debt levy is up 21 mills, the library 5 mills and the levy for sewers 2.77 mills.

WILLOWDALE. Willowdale residents are overwhelmingly against having their post office and postal delivery area renamed North York, Controller Paul Hunt said last week.

Hunt said nearly 100 persons had mailed in coupons protesting a North York Council decision to ask the post office to drop the Willowdale name, and only six were in favor.

Council voted May 20 to ask to change the name to North York Post Office.
