New Library Needed For Thornhill Says Board Chairman

The population of Markham Township is increasing by leaps and bounds, and Markham Township Public Library Board is wondering how it can best prepare to provide library services that will be needed.

Greatest need, says Mrs. Ruth Nichols, of Bayview Glen in Thornhill president of the Markham Township Library Board, is for a new library to serve the greater Thornhill area.

The library on Colborne Street is a charming old building, and the librarians have taken antiques from their own homes to decorate the interior, but said Mrs. Nichols, the space is hopelessly inadequate.

In addition to improved services for students, facilities are needed for other age groups; picture books and story hours for pre-schoolers, materials for adults enrolled in educational and hobby classes, and books for use of the curious in any channel of interest.

To help meet the need, the board made reciprocal arrangements with libraries in Richmond Hill, Vaughan Township, and North York. However, since these libraries are also in rapidly growing areas, such arrangements could only be made for children.

Adults with Metro business addresses may use North York libraries, says the report. "The reciprocal arrangement... has worked, so far, to our benefit. But how long can these libraries, with their own communities growing at the same pace as ours, be expected to serve our people?"

When the township library board was established in 1966, by provincial legislation, there were two small libraries operating, one in Unionville. The board first concentrated its efforts on the geographical centre of the township, and the new Unionville Library was built as the township's project for Centennial year. The building was planned for expansion,

Population of the area (bounded by Yonge Street, Leslie Street, Steeles Avenue to about one-half mile south of Highway 7) is about 10,000, and at the present rate of growth the board expects it will reach 22,000 by 1974 and 43,000 by 1979.

Mrs. Nichols considers this a conservative estimate. She points out that there are several large subdivision developments in woods - Selkirk, Bay Woods, and Thornhill Green, as well as considerable apartment development on Yonge Street.

Furnishings available for public use at Thornhill Library consist of one desk and three chairs. "There is no place for students to work, and if a class came in it would create havoc."

The library at the end of 1968 had 8,000 books, and circulation for the year was 35,000 books. "For the population of the area, annual circulation should have been 95,000 books," states the report.

Examples of kindergarten work from area schools were shown to parents and included paintings, robot boxes, construction paper articles and simple experience charts made by the children.

Public and municipal support is needed if the libraries are to provide the services that are needed for the total community. "We are quite concerned," said Mrs. Nichols, "You need more than just water, roads and sewers to serve people."
