The library on Colborne Street is a charming old building, and the librarians have taken antiques from their own homes to decorate the interior, but said Mrs. Nichols, the space is hopelessly inadequate.

In a recent report to the ratepayers, the library board said that in 1968, \$10,000 was budgeted for books for the Thornhill Library, nearly filling the shelves. The book allowance for 1969 was, therefore cut by 40 percent because of limited shelf

To provide minimum services, said the report, they will need 24,000 square feet of space to house 100,000 books, seating space for 120 persons, and facilities to circulate 360,000 books an-

The library at the end of 1968 had 8,000 books, and circulation for the year was 35,000 books.

"For the population of the area, annual circulation should have been 95,000 books." states the report.
