### Separate Schools Add Another Bus

An additional bus will be purchased by York County Separate School Board to relieve overcrowding of buses in the Newmarket area. Business Administrator Percy Laframboise reported at the board's September 16 meeting that some buses are carrying up to 90 or 100 children. On the previous day a rented bus with a qualified driver had started.

The Newmarket area is served by board-owned buses, a legacy of the former Newmarket Separate School Board, and the only area in the county to be so served.

This will be the second bus purchased this season. A 72-seat bus was purchased to cover one of the trunk routes to transport grade 9 students to Roman Catholic high schools in Metro. The new bus will bring the board's fleet to seven, five serving the Newmarket area and two on the trunk routes. Two buses are made available each day for excursions.

Cost of the new bus is estimated at \$9,000, the price of the one purchased a few weeks ago.

The additional bus should permit children to arrive at school and back home again at more reasonable times, the business administrator commented.

### Businesses, Homes Targets Of Thieves

Weekend thieves victimized three service stations, a restaurant and two residences in Vaughan Township.

Police report service stations were on Yonge Street at Elgin Mills Road West, on Dufferin Street and on Highway 7.

Small amounts of cash were taken in each of the break-ins which occurred between September 19 and September 20.

Cash was also taken after a restaurant on Yonge Street north of Richmond Hill was entered on September 19.

The residences, located on Hillside Avenue and at the intersection of Concord and Birch Avenue in Richvale also netted cash for the thief or thieves.

SCARBORO — Students can learn to swim in a small pool just as well as they can in a big one. Scarborough school trustees decided last night.

They refused to pay an extra \$50,000 to make a planned pool at West Hill Collegiate Olympic size as requested by the borough recreation and parks department.

Scarboro Council and Board of Education each budgeted \$150,000 in May toward the \$300,000 cost of the West Hill pool. At this price, the pool would lack diving facilities and measure 75 feet, 1 inch in length by 36 feet, with a depth ranging from three feet to five feet.
