The decision to have a one-year term of office was made at a special council meeting on October 15 and there was no discussion of the proposal at Tuesday night's meeting. The one-year term bylaw establishes November 21 at 7 pm in the Vander Community Hall as the time and place for nominations and if council is not voted to office by acclamation, a vote will be held between the hours of 10 am and 8 pm in the township.
