
There are always two sides to a story and OMNI OBLI will supply the opportunity for students and educators to tell theirs.

Bramalea Says No Profit At Villa
 When the directors of the Unionville Home Society awarded the contract for construction of the Union Villa residence for senior citizens, they got a better bargain than they had anticipated.
 Architects John B. Parkin and Associates of Don Mills had estimated the cost at \$1,700,000. The contract was awarded to Bramalea General Contracting (Peel) Limited, whose bid of \$1,653,000, was the lowest, and the only bid under the architect's estimate.
 Bramalea does not intend to make a profit on the construction, and if it does, the profit will be turned back to the Unionville Home Society. Arthur Armstrong, executive vice-president of Bramalea Consolidated Developments Limited, has announced that construction costs will be carefully reviewed, and on the basis of certified accounting, any amount over actual cost will be donated to the Villa.
 Ground has already been broken on the 13 acre site on Highway 7 west of Kennedy Road, and the greater part of building and equipping the Villa will be covered by provincial grants, but the society still has to raise \$300,000 to complete the project.
 The Villa has been designed to accommodate 163 beds — 80 single rooms, 25 double, 16 double bed-care rooms and one infirmary. It will also include lounges and recreation areas, and will serve southern York County residents.
 In making the announcement of its intention to contribute financially as well as practically to the home, Bramalea points out that it is involved in land development in the Unionville area through an associated company, Village in the Valley Limited, and recognizes its responsibility in local community projects.
 Board Chairman Keith Kennedy reports that the response to the fund raising drive has been excellent so far.
 Mr. Kennedy has explained that the fund raising is being carried out entirely by volunteers under direction of the volunteer board of directors, and hopes that residents as well as commercial and industrial corporations will be generous in their donations.

Christmas Card Sales Aids Retarded Workers
 Students of local high schools will once again blitz the area, selling Christmas Cards on behalf of York Central Association for the Mentally Retarded. This year the students will be carrying six types of hand-crafted cards made by the trainees at ARC Industries, 321 Enford Road, the sheltered workshop for mentally retarded young adults. They will also have a selection of regular Christmas cards.
 "By selling these cards, we are offsetting a major portion of the Workshop expenses, and thus making it as self-supporting as possible," says Dr. Arnold Aral, president of the YCAMA.
 On October 28, the students from Markham, Stouffville and Thornlea Secondary Schools will be blitzing their areas, followed by Bayview, Langstaff and Thornhill Secondary on October 29.
 Richmond Hill, King and Woodbridge High will be blitzing their committee on October 30.
 In the past, says Dr. Aral, interest among the students has been keen and there has been a competitive atmosphere throughout the blitz to see which school could outdo the other.
 Some of them wind up the evening with a dance or other celebration, making it a festive as well as a profitable evening.

All three questions asked on last Saturday's liquor plebiscite in Vaughan Township went down to defeat as only 9.53% of the eligible voters went to the polls.
 For women's beverage rooms 49.51% of those who voted defeated a favorable ballot and 50.49% voted no.
 For men's beverage rooms 30.63% voted yes and 69.37% voted no.
 Cocktail lounges came much closer to carrying with 58.03% in favor and 41.97% against. This was the fourth vote in the last nine years. Three years ago Vaughan voters, after a vigorous "get out the vote" campaign approved liquor with meals and beer and liquor retail outlets. Cocktail lounges, after two recounts lost out by one vote.
 The pattern, evident in former campaigns where the built-up areas were predominantly "wet" and the rural communities were predominantly "dry", was evident again in Saturday's vote.
 In Maple Southwest, where 45 of 427 eligible voters went to the polling station, the vote for women's beverage rooms was 31-12 in favor, for men's beverage rooms 14-30 against and for cocktail lounges 35-9 in favor.
 At Teston, a rural community, where 41 of a possible 235 voters turned out, they turned down women's beverage rooms 14-25, men's beverage rooms 9-30 and cocktail lounges 17-22.
 Largest turnout was at the Jefferson poll where 60 of 357 voters showed up. They voted 34-24 in favor of women's beverage rooms, 16-41 against men's beverage rooms and 38-20 in favor of cocktail lounges.
 The smallest number, seven voters were registered at Scott East poll, out of a total of 211. They voted 5-2, 3-2 and 5-2 on the three questions.

 for one, would not start making exceptions now."
 "I think the expense of expropriation is justified in this case. I am supporting Mr. Higgins," declared Councillor William Lazenby.
 This particular property is used for residential purposes but is zoned for commercial," pointed out Councillor John MacDiarmid. "The trees have value only if it remains residential."
 Mr. Higgins then reported that the compensation set had been for commercial property, a higher rate than for residential. "The trees are academic," he stated. "As an appraiser I don't see any injurious effect to the remainder."
 "In other words," summed up Mr. MacDiarmid, "if the residential rate had been used, the trees would have had more value and the land less."
 "The information I have is that the trees are to remain anyway," added Mrs. Hancey.
 In presenting the motion to proceed with annexation, Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins pointed out that "Times is of the essence. There have been let, and work will be started soon. I was hopeful we could have done without expropriation. There are close to 80 properties involved, with only a few to get in the south end as well as the three in the north end. You've done an excellent job," he said to Mr. Higgins.

To Protest Pollutants At Toronto City Hall
 The Campaign for Better Advertising, with its nucleus in Richvale, plans to demonstrate at Toronto City Hall against phosphates in detergents.
 Co-ordinator Mrs. Bernice Lever, 79 Denham Drive, reports that the group will begin at 11 a.m. and collect signatures on giant letters to the three major detergent makers, who turn out 17 brands, and deliver the letters in person to the head office of each company.
 Detergents, the committee points out, are largely responsible for pollution of soil and water in the Great Lakes area.
 At a meeting in St. Michael and All Angels Anglican Church, St. Clair Avenue West, at 8 p.m. on October 30, the committee will consider diet drinks. The public is invited and questions on consumer protection will be answered.
 "Consumers must join forces to fight public and private pollution," Mrs. Lever declares. "Give your views to the press and write your federal and provincial representatives in Ottawa or Queen's Park. Dare you let the 'other fellow' decide how many years of life are left?"

 Councillor Betty van Nstrand and Mrs. Jean van Nstrand, of the promotion and publicity committee of the Bogartown Museum Board, returned home this weekend with information they hope will help to make the new museum one that all Whitchurch Township residents will be proud to call their own.
 They attended a museum workshop held October 17 and 18 in Belleville that had as its theme "Promotion and Publicity". Panel discussions and workshop assignments on this theme were balanced by a bus tour of historical sites in Hastings and Prince Edward Counties.
