

'Y' Winter Fitness Program Underway But Hill Girls, Boys Not Turning Out

Calling all Richmond Hill girls and boys from ages 8 to 13 who want to keep fit, get fit, or just have fun while doing it.

That's the "welcome" sign now being flashed by the Richmond Hill YWCA as it embarks on another winter's fitness program in conjunction with the local recreation committee which is supplying funds.

"This is our second year of operating the 10-week program," stated Mrs. Gwen Halliday, program director at the Y. "It was a tremendous success last year. We must have had some 500 children participating in our activities.

Therein lies the rub. So far this year?

"We've circulated registration forms throughout the schools but there just hasn't been that much response, it's been very disappointing. We've had about 150 show up to date although it is still early.

"Registration fee for 10 weeks has been set at \$1 this year and I can't imagine this being any type of a hardship. The one exception is at Richmond Hill High School where we will be using gym equipment and the fee there is \$3."

This year's program will be under very capable hands in the persons of young but experienced instructors. All the chief instructors are currently attending university and are experienced in teaching phys-ed.

Trudy Wensell will be co-ordinating the overall program for the first time.

Instructors for the girls will include Stephanie MacKenzie, Bev. Markle, Karen Lark, Pia Schenk, and others.

For the boys it will be Paul O'Brien and Louis Vanderploeg assisted by other such stalwarts as Hugh MacKenzie, Mark Griffiths, and Brian Gentles.

An added plus for youngsters participating in the Richmond Hill High School segment of the program will be Tom Kivimaki who is an expert gymnastic teacher.

Woman Struck By Car At Richvale Is Pronounced Dead At York Central

Mrs. Giovanna Farano, of 72 Yongehurst Boulevard, Richvale, was killed at the intersection of Yonge Street and May Avenue in Richvale when she was struck by a car driven by Howard Ahrens, of 21 Machell Street, Aurora, at 4:28 pm on October 17. She was pronounced dead at Toronto General Hospital.

Four persons were injured in a two-car collision on Highway 11 at Davis Drive on the outskirts of Newmarket at 7:15 pm on October 13.

Gloria Brown and Donna Mae Brown, 4 passengers in a car driven by Neil Brown, 6 Cavely Drive, Weston, received arm and head injuries. Anna Vukosovic and Antonio Vukosovic, 13, of 75 Temperance Street, Aurora, passengers in a car driven by Branko Vukosovic, received head injuries.

William Young, 367 Eagle Street, Newmarket, and Howard Rooney, of RR 2, Newmarket, received head lacerations when their cars collided at 1:30 am on Highway 11 at Federal Farms Road.

Swartz Youngren, 72, of Bradford, received lacerations to his head and a fractured leg. He was a passenger in the Young vehicle.

Mrs. Eva Rooney, a passenger in the Rooney car, received head lacerations and a fractured pelvis. Damage was estimated at \$1,200.

Man Is Acquitted In Rape Case By Ontario Supreme Court Jury

A 21-year-old Richmond Hill man was acquitted by an Ontario Supreme Court jury on October 17 of raping a 19-year-old girl at a Satan's Choice drinking party on June 14 in a field off Meadowvale Road in Scarborough.

Wayne Kelly, six-foot-three and weighing 235 pounds, signed in relief and slumped forward in the prisoner's box when the jury announced its verdict after deliberating nearly 4 1/2 hours.

Mr. Kelly was defended by Alf Stong Jr., of Richmond Hill, who admitted the girl was "gang raped", but said that because of the darkness and her hysteria she was wrong in her identification of Mr. Kelly.

Mr. Kelly took the stand and denied he raped the girl or even led her into the field where the attack took place. The girl had testified Mr. Kelly led her to the spot where she was attacked by at least five motorcyclists while more than 20 crowded around and watched. She identified Mr. Kelly as the man she had met earlier in the day at the home of a friend.

Mr. Justice Campbell Grant told Mr. Kelly he doubted he would heed any advice he could give him. But he added: "It's well that you consider a different way of life."

The jury of 10 men and two women returned shortly after 4 pm and asked Mr. Justice Grant about the Criminal Code section concerning persons aiding and abetting a crime.

Mr. Justice Grant told them that since the Crown had based its case on Mr. Kelly actually
