

## York North 4-H Achievement Day Is Scheduled For November 29

A special invitation is extended to parents, friends and members of Women's Institutes in York County to attend afternoon programs of 4-H Homemaking Club Achievement Days.

Club members are also being asked to invite their parents and friends and to submit their record books and crafts to the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food office in Newmarket not later than Friday for the York North area and not later than November 28 for York South area.

Each exhibit should include a poster giving the topic and name of the club. A representative from each club will give a three-minute comment on the exhibit.

For club demonstrations or skits, the topics are: Posture Plays Its Part; First Aid In The Home; A Craft For Leisure Time; Using Your Leisure Time; Safety In The Home or Safety On The Highways.

Club demonstrations are usually done by two or three members of each club while skits involve three or more members and the allotted time for each demonstration is 10 minutes.

Achievement days will begin with registration at 9.15 am and introductions and announcements at 9.30 am, followed by presentation of leaders' badges; judging of first aid kits; road traffic sign identification; farm and home hazard activities and discussion of activities.

The noon luncheon at Newmarket will be prepared by the York Centre District Women's Institute and at Nobleton by the York West District Women's Institute.

The day will resume at 1.30 pm with the presentation of skits, demonstrations and exhibits, followed by presentation of awards.

All 4-H members are also asked to bring a pencil or pen to achievement day and if unable to attend, a note is required and should be sent to the home economist before achievement day.

Achievement day in York North will be held at Trinity United Church in Newmarket on November 29 and achievement day in York South will be held at the Nobleton Community Centre on December 6.

York County Women's Institute Scholarships will be presented during the achievement day programs at both centres.

Individual exhibits will include record books, crafts and first aid kits.

## United York-Oshawa Health Units May Not Be Answer County Needs

The first year of operation for the amalgamated York-Oshawa Health Unit has been a "very busy one" but at least one person feels it isn't the answer to the problem.

That person is East Gwillimbury Reeve Garfield Wright who is also the first chairman of the combined health board. He was reporting November 6 to York County Council in session at Newmarket.

"It's definitely been a very busy year," Mr. Wright said pointing out the increased territory and staff members required to cope with the new regional unit.

The new board employs a total of 117 full-time staff members, 72 of them in the York County offices in Newmarket, 45 in Oshawa.

Reeve Wright assessed the results of the first year of operation stating that "I doubt if amalgamation of the two health bodies is the right answer."

Mr. Wright pointed out the distance to be covered between York and Oshawa stating that it "makes it difficult to accomplish certain things I feel could be accomplished better on a local level."

"We in York County," he said, "expect that we'll need a health unit as big as the present one or even bigger in the future."

He also noted that the present York MOH, Dr. Owen Slingerland, also found it difficult to be in two places at once.

"He's expected to be in Newmarket and Oshawa at the same time which, of course, is impossible."

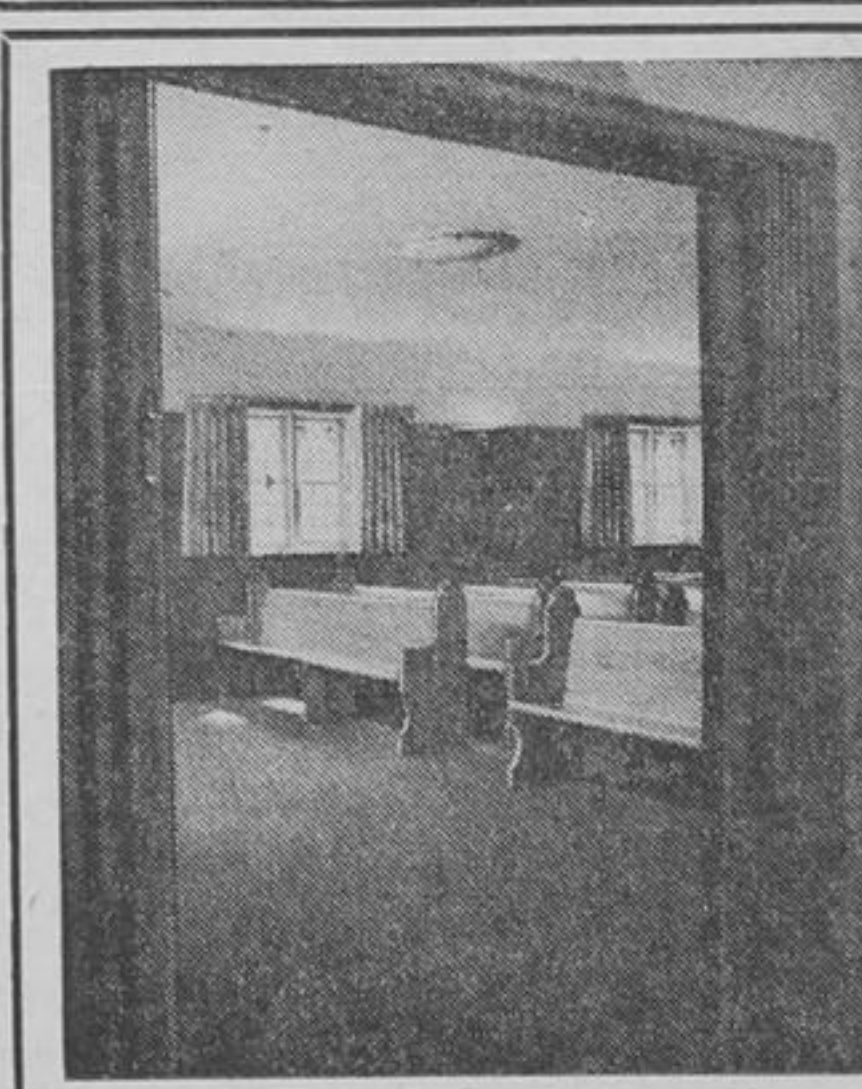

The flying-up ceremony will be held November 25 at the regular Guide meeting.

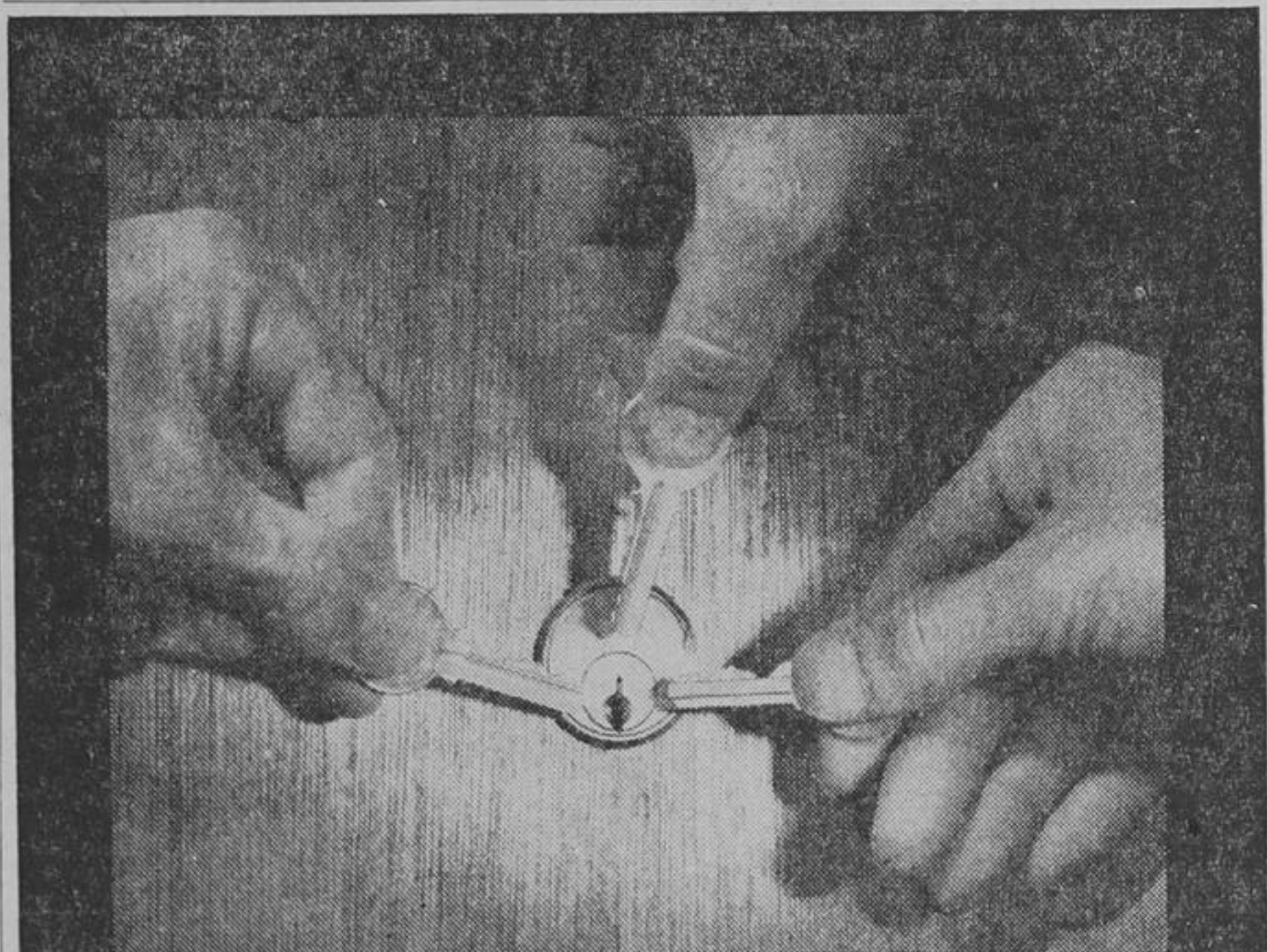
**Late Mrs. Nellie Bell**
