## Thornhill Recreation Committee Plans For Future

Thornhill Area Recreation Committee members have been doing "their thing" for the past 20 years and its taken the rest of the world that long to get around to doing it too. What's the thing? Co-ordinating recreational activities instead of becoming actively involved in them, actively running them. This was the word December 11 from David Parker of the Community Programs Branch of the Department of Education. He was guest speaker at the TARC's annual meeting held at Woodland Public School. "I came here tonight to advise you to do what I've subsequently learned you've been doing for the past 20 years," said Mr. Parker. "It is only recently that it has become the provincial trend whereby the various recreational committees are getting out of the actual programming of area activities and into the co-ordinating of groups who run the programs themselves. You've been doing this all along. I

congratulate you." Mr. Parker did throw out some suggestions which included: An even greater effort to assure that the committee is reaching all the people in the community and finding out their recreational desires and needs. To investigate areas involving cultural and intellectual activities other than just strictly physical activities. To consider appointing representatives on the committee from such groups as the senior citizens as well as committee members from younger groups in the community. Mr. Parker stressed that in today's society the word recreation covered almost everything that didn't entail a person's actual working day on the job. Physical activity is only one facet of a recreational committee's program. TARC Chairman Peter Rossi reviewed the past year's activities and also urged the committee to see that the entire community is

aware of the recreational facilities that are available. "We've got to try to reach everyone, make them realize the facilities are there for them to use. We have the facilities and in a number of cases the money if required to get a program underway." Mr. Rossi said two of the programs he would particularly like to see initiated in 1970 are figure skating for the girls and wrestling for the boys. He also called for the Townships of Markham and Vaughan to hire full-time recreational directors. "Markham has had a director during the summer months for the past two years but I think we should press for full-time recreational directors in both municipalities," he said. Mr. Rossi said future planning should be directed towards eventually establishing a recreational centre where all the area's activities could be located. "This could include a new arena, swimming pool, tennis and other facilities. We would have them all in one location. I realize this can't be accomplished over night but the time to get started is now. It would have to be a joint venture by both Markham and Vaughan Townships. The chairman also plump-

ed for the recreation committee's blue-covered information booklet which outlines all the activities available in the Thornhill area as co-ordinated by the TARC. The activities of any club or group not included in the booklet should write to P.O. Box 142, Thornhill. Copies of the booklet may be obtained free of charge by writing to the same address. Reports of the various recreational activities during the year were read. Three new members were elected to the committee: They are Leonard Ehrlich, Douglas MacMillan and Arie Van Velzen. They replace John Gamblin, Bill Seelye, and Mr. Rossi was moved up to the post of past chairman in 1970. The 1970 chairman will be selected at the committee's inaugural meeting planned for January 15. Other members of the 1970 committee are: Glen Rae, Dennis Moore, Eric Cole, William Bambridge, Bryon Ring, and Stan Finch. The secretary is Mrs. Norma Sautman.

## York County Board Considers Bursary For Late Eilert Sand

A request from Royal Orchard Community Parent Education Program that the next new school in the area be named for the late Eilert Sand was rejected by York County Board of Education at a meeting December 16. A planning official with the board, and for many years a teacher and principal with the former Vaughan and Markham Township Public School Boards, Mr. Sand was also active in church and community work up to the time of his sudden passing in November while on a trip to Sault Ste. Marie. Trustees suggested it would be more fitting to place a picture or a plaque in a school to commemorate his name, and to set up a bursary or student fund. It was pointed out that new board policy regarding naming of schools requires that when the name of a person is used, it should be that of a person prominent in national history. Chairman John MacKay mentioned that Mr. Sand was very much interested in the musical programs in the school. "He had a deep love for children, and the home and school might like to co-operated in some type of memorial." It is worthwhile to have a remembrance of the type of contribution people such as Mr. Sand make to education, agreed Director Sam Chapman but within ten or 15 years there are few people in the community who know who the person was whose name is thus commemorated. He cited McConghly and MacKillop Public Schools in Richmond Hill as examples. "A bursary to a student in the area where he was known would perhaps be more suitable," Mr. Chapman declared. "The policy we passed on school names reflected Eilert's thinking," added Trustee Louise Aimeone of Markham Township, a former trustee with the old board where Mr. Sand served as secretary and senior principal.

**Underground Oil Pact, Markham Adds Clause**  
Markham Township has added a clause to its proposed agreement with Public Fuel Transmission System that would revoke the firm's franchise if contamination takes place by emission of fuel oil from the company line. Public Fuels intends to install an underground fuel oil distribution system in Bayview Subdivision. Council authorized the reeve and clerk of the township to sign an agreement with the company by a 3-2 recorded vote at its October 20 meeting. The additional clause to the contract, approved at the December 15 session of council, further stipulated that: Upon revocation of the contract the company will take necessary steps to prevent further contamination and immediately stop service.

**Approach TYRC**  
Traffic Is Continuing Hazard At Thornlea  
York County Board of Education will ask Toronto and York Roads Commission to examine traffic hazards in the vicinity of Thornlea Secondary School before proceeding with the widening of Bayview Avenue north of Highway 7. When the school opened in September, 1968, concerned parents appealed to the former York Central District High School Board which enlisted the co-operation of Markham Township Police Department, and an officer was posted at the school morning and after school to ensure that students could cross safely from the west side of the road to the east side where the school is located and back again. The situation is particularly hazardous during the morning rush hour and in winter, the road was told, when snow is piled in ditches and on the shoulder. Various alternatives were suggested, underpasses, overpasses, sidewalks, crosswalks. Vaughan Township Trustee Warren Baillie told the trustees that the former Vaughan Township Public School Board in co-operation with the Toronto and York Roads Commission had undertaken a "road profile" study, and that shoulders were often extended to ten feet in the vicinity of schools, with walkways for the children. Chairman John MacKay, trustee for Markham Township, urged that the staff ask TYRC to study the traffic situation on Bayview Avenue in the vicinity of the Thornlea school before the road is widened.
