Allan Lawrence Mines Minister Answers Pits, Quarries Bill

Ontario Minister of Mines Allan Lawrence last week answered some criticisms of his proposed bill to transfer control of gravel pits and stone quarries to the province from the municipalities.

Of prime importance was his statement that the provincial government is not irrevocably committed to this piece of legislation. "If it is obvious that the majority of the municipalities wish the jurisdiction for control to remain as it now is, in the municipalities, then the government will not proceed," Mr. Lawrence stated.

He also said he believes, personally, the province does have the responsibility and duty to enact province-wide controls. Because of that belief he is asking all those who are concerned to write to him.

He branded as untrue the allegation that the public is not able to obtain a copy of the suggested legislation or the report of the Mineral Resources Committee on which it is based. Both are contained in a book released December 12 and distributed to the press and all members of the Legislature. It is available free of charge to anyone who wants it. Also untrue, he claims, is

the suggestion that the municipalities are not being consulted. "Representatives of the Department of Municipal Affairs helped to formulate the report and early last month copies of it and the suggested legislation were sent to all municipal councils in the province and the major municipal associations. Their comments were asked for with a February 15, 1970, deadline," the Minister pointed out.

He went on to note that "even though no other jurisdiction in the western world has been able to come up with meaningful 'anti-noise' legislation, the government is trying to incorporate the latest known standards and the best methods of determining and enforcing proper levels. We also hope to control dust, conditions

and hours of work." The present chaotic conditions are the result of un-planned, unused or unenforced municipal regulations or jurisdiction.

"We have a crazy-quilt patchwork of regulations throughout Southern Ontario. We believe this is not good for the public, the municipalities or the industry and that the province should step in. However, if we are
