Red Hot Steel Plate Kindles Fire At Canadian Heat Treaters Plant

A small fire after an accident at Canadian Heat Treaters Ltd., 300 Newkirk Road, Richmond Hill, was the most serious of several minor fire calls in the area during the past week.

At 6:15 pm January 14 a fastener broke away while a red hot steel plate was being removed from a furnace at the Newkirk Road plant. The plate was at about 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit and it stopped below an overhead crane. The rising heat kindled some plank used as a walking platform at the crane.

Town firemen had little difficulty putting out the fire and there was little damage, Chief Alf Stong said. Out in Southern York County there were some chimney and car fires, plus some false alarms.

January 25 at 9:39 am Vaughan Township Firemen were called to York Central Hospital, but there was no fire. There was another false alarm January 26 when rubbish was being burned at the Thornhill Boarding and Sales Stables, 600 Yonge Street North. A passerby noticed the flames and called firemen at 10:17 pm.

At 8:14 pm January 23, at Lot 16, Concession 2 (Carrville Road) there was a chimney fire, but no damage to the home owned by John Nesbitt. Also January 23 there was a car on fire at 12:59 pm on Highway 400 just north of the Maple Sideroad. Vaughan firemen confined the fire to the car's back seat. Fire Chief James Davidson said cigarettes thrown from a car's front seat sometimes blow back into the car through a rear window, and this was probably the cause of the fire. The car belonged to Lynda Grimes of 100 Maitland Street, Toronto.

January 18 at 7:37 am at 56 Weldrick Road in Richvale an overheated furnace model filled the house with smoke and firemen were called. There was no fire.

At Kleinburg January 24 at 11:34 pm there was a chimney fire at 68 Sevilla Boulevard. There was no fire damage, Vaughan firemen report.

At Unionville January 16 at Varley Drive and Main Street there was a fire in a construction shack on the site of the Unionville reservoir now under construction. Damage was confined to lumber stored in the shack.

At Highway 7 and Concession 7 there was a chimney fire January 25 at the home of Harry Marlowe, Lot 11.

WILLOWDALE—North York School Trustee Val Scott was outvoted 10-to-3 last week in a bid to get the borough's school board to ask North York Council for a bylaw banning election signs on public streets. Scott argued that signs are costly, wasteful, unsightly and cause unnecessary campaign expenses. He said, however, that signs on private property and homeowners' lawns should not be prohibited. Opposing Scott's recommendation, Trustee Mel Shipman said he could not support a move that would restrict candidates' freedom in expressing their message to the electorate. Douglas Malcolm and Separate School Trustee Robert Bradley voted with Scott.

Markham Council Briefs

A public hearing will be held by Markham Township Planning Board tonight (Thursday) at 8 pm in the council chambers to consider a new Langstaff zoning bylaw for part of Lot 35, Concession 1. The area concerned is bounded by Holy Cross Cemetery, Yonge Street, Highway 7 and Bayview Avenue.

This year's new member of the Markham Recreation Committee and Parks Management Board is George Churchill of 4 Baymark Avenue, North Thornhill. The other members are: George Greer, Grandview Avenue, South Thornhill; George Metcalfe, Unionville; Zolly Berta, Victoria Square; Mrs. Kay Greenwood, Wild Cherry Lane, Thornhill and Councillor Eldred King and Deputy-reeve Anthony Roman. These are also the members of the Grandview Athletic Field Board.

Council last week adopted a new bylaw licensing all food establishments in the township. Previously only restaurants and snack bars were licensed. Now all food handling establishments are included in the legislation. Plaxton, Mansbridge Question Arbitration On School Assets

Reeve Donald Plaxton would like to know what credit Richmond Hill is receiving for its capital assets in the educational field, he stated at the January 19 meeting of Richmond Hill Town Council. Under discussion was a report presented by the board of arbitration set up in York County to "value and adjust in an equitable manner the assets and liabilities of prior school boards as of December 1968."

Members of the board of arbitration were William Errington, QC, Charles E. Boyd and Stewart Joscelyn. Mr. Joscelyn is the town's auditor. The board's report indicated that it had considered: surplus or deficit of each constituent former board, prepaid audit fees, lands and buildings not used as schools, vehicles, consumable supplies, prepaid insurance, reserve funds, teachers, salary adjustments, vacant school sites, tax write-offs, retirement gratuities, capital surplus and/or deficit, Vaughan Hydro account, Aurora Public School Board legal action and

the effect a surplus or deficit of any one or more prior school board might have on the general tax rate in the municipalities over the next three years. It reports a total credit for Richmond Hill of \$44,875 made up of \$2,615 for secondary schools and \$42,260 for elementary schools. The York County Board of Education accepted the arbitrators' recommendation to spread collection of deficits and payment of surpluses over a three year period to lessen the impact on the mill rate in any one year.

"We were assured this assessment would be on the most equitable basis, but maybe the legislation is not equitable," commented the reeve. Deputy-reeve Ivan Mansbridge believed the board of education should be asked to spend Richmond Hill's surplus on "improving the appearance of the local school grounds," rather than have it returned to the taxpayers.

Council agreed to investigate the matter more fully. Monday, January 19, Richmond Hill Town Council approved the following appointments to various boards and committees: Planning Board: Harry Sayers and Donald Barnett were reappointed for a three year term. Other members of the board are Ivan Toutloff, Ken Brown, Howard Whillans and Mayor William Lazenby. Councillor Lois Hancey will serve as the mayor's alternate and Councillor David Schiller will be the council representative for 1970. Barry McKinnon is the planning administrator.

Committee of Adjustment: Former Councillor John MacDiarmid, who was defeated in a bid for the deputy-reeve's chair in December, was appointed for a three year term and Howard Jackman for one year to fill out the term of W. J. (Tom) Taylor, who has moved to Sutton. Others on the five-member committee are: David Higgins, Tom Graham and William Rutledge.

Parks and Recreation Committee: John Pennysfather, Paul Flood, Bruce Venn, Russell Tilt, Harold Jones, Andy Chauvert, Herb Wunderlich and Pat Deciantis. Councillors Shaun Beggs and Eric George will be the council representatives. Library Board: Mrs. Ruth McConkey (vice-chairman) was re-appointed for a three year term and Councillor Hancey was named council representative for this year. Other members of this board include: Cam Smith (appointed by council); John Riswick and Mrs. Don Montague (appointed by the York County Roman Catholic School Board); Mrs. Robert Fountain, Mrs. James Downey and Alex Campbell (appointed by the York County Board of Education).

Central Ontario Regional Development Council: Kenneth Tomlin was appointed as lay delegate and Councillor Hancey as council representative. Metro Conservation Authority: Former Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins and Dr. Douglas Pimlott were re-appointed for one year. Day Care Centre: David Porter, Mrs. Robert Smith, Mrs. Ruth Cook, Mrs. Neil Mann, Mrs. Winona MacDonald, Rev. P. A. Sorenson, Dr. John Wynne, Gary Chatfield and Dr. Kathleen Fullerton. Councillor Schiller will be council's representative on this committee.

Fence viewers: Norm Stephenson, Andy Chateauvert, Leslie Smith. Weed inspector: Fred Boivard. Township Council has agreed to share equally with the Town of Markham, the cost of acquiring a former school, SS 16, for use as a museum. Council last week approved payment of bills totalling \$1,375,000. The reason for this large amount all at once was the payment of close to \$500,000 to York County and to the York County School Board, plus \$143,000 for roads and a large sum to the York County Roman Catholic School Board. Toronto Lawyer Thomas Storie of Messrs. Miller, Thomson, Kicks, Sedgewick, Lewis and Healy was named by council to act on the arbitration board in the township's contract dispute with employee members of the Canadian Union of Public Employees. Council agreed to purchase for \$24,000 a John Street lot for construction of a new reservoir. Owners of the lot were S. B. McLaughlin and Associates Ltd. and the lot has 359 feet frontage and a depth of 300 feet. Preparation of a bylaw was ordered following receipt of a petition from residents in the Perth and Terry Avenue area. They want all of Lot 10, Concession 3 East, zoned for single family dwellings.

Roman Catholic Teachers Study Family Life Ed.

Nineteen Roman Catholic School Teachers from York County will be taking a six week course in family life education at Lakehead University in Thunder Bay next summer at board expense.

At its regular meeting the board agreed that it should aim to have the course under way in all schools in the system by January 1, 1971. The family life program has been discussed at length at several meetings of teachers and trustees, and several principals, teachers and trustees attended a two-day live-in last fall to hear experts describe a curriculum that would involve all phases of family living and relationships within the family.

Many who had previously been reluctant to consider such a program became enthusiastic after several sessions with Father Leo Lafreniere, who will be conducting the summer course at the Family Life Institute at Lakehead. There are now 18 separate schools in the county, and a new school will open in September in North Thornhill. Teachers or principals who have graduated from the course will serve as resource people in their schools, working from September to January with other members of the staff to set up a course.

Meanwhile a committee of teachers and trustees will work together to let the parents know what the course is all about. Since this will be a course imposed on staff by the board, the trustees agreed the board should pay the cost and after lengthy discussion agreed to allot \$500 to each person going to Lakehead to help defray \$200 tuition fee, travelling and living expenses.

It was emphasized that they did not wish to set a precedent in footing the bill for courses teachers might wish to take to improve their qualifications since credits earned at university courses can be accumulated to place the teacher in a higher category and hence in a higher pay bracket. The family life course is recognized as a credit course at Lakehead and at the University of Ottawa, but not at other Ontario universities.

It had been suggested earlier that the board hire a co-ordinator at a salary of \$10,000 to set up the course, but Superintendent Joseph Hodge said that after meeting with principals, it was agreed a more satisfactory program could be worked out through intensive training of board staff who will work full time in one school.

"The principals do not want a co-ordinator," agreed Dr. William LaCroix, trustee for Markham Township. "The teachers want the program to come from within the school, geared to the community as a whole, not imposed from above." A committee of principals, members of the educational development committee and staff will help in selecting applicants from among teachers now on staff with the board.

Dr. LaCroix suggested that the board's liaison committee discuss its plans with representatives of the York County Board of Education. "We should let them know what we are doing, and find out what they may be planning in family life education."

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
