GROUND HOG

- 1 cup elbow macaroni
1 qt. boiling salted water
1 lb. ground beef
1 large onion, chopped
1 sweet green pepper, chopped
1 10 oz. can vegetable soup
1 10 oz. can tomato soup
12 tsp. salt
Dash of tabasco (opt.)
Stir macaroni in water for 5 minutes. Drain. Mixing remaining ingredients together, combine with macaroni in large casserole. Make a well around outside edges of dish to collect grease. Cover. Bake 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove cover. Bake 30 minutes longer. Pour off grease. Yield 8 to 10 servings.

Diabetes Is Topic Public Meeting

What is diabetes, and how common is it? Richmond Hill Lions Club will give the public an opportunity to find out at a special meeting at Lions Hall, Centre Street East, at 8:15 pm February 19.

The program will begin with a filmed interview with Dr. Charles Best, co-discoverer of insulin, and will be followed by a question and answer period.

Sonnie Cohen, president of the Toronto District Branch, Canadian Diabetic Association, and Dr. James Langstaff of Richmond Hill, will be there to answer questions from the audience.

The GDA set up a free blood test clinic at the CNE last summer, and Mr. Cohen reported that 200 of the 10,000 people tested were found to have diabetes.

It is estimated there are about 200,000 known diabetics in Canada and almost as many again unknown.

A person can develop diabetes at any age, but the most likely prospects are those who are overweight, over 40 and related to known diabetics. After 45 three diabetics out of five are women.

The most usual symptoms are increase in thirst, change of appetite, frequent urination, loss of weight, itching, easy tiring, blurring of vision and palpitation.

It can be controlled, however, by planned diet, exercise and in many cases insulin or oral medication. Sometimes insulin must be injected, but in many cases tablets, along with a planned diet, are sufficient.

As a follow-up to the meeting next week, the Lions are planning to hold a public diabetic clinic in the Lions Hall about the middle of March.

The program has been planned by the Lions Club Health and Welfare Committee: Lions Grant Marshall, Donald Andrews and Dr. James Langstaff.
