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2 Brush Wolves Dead,
Few Left At Langstaff?
Three or four wolves... a rarity in Vaughan Township... have been creating some excitement lately in the Langstaff area. But there are only one or two left.
One ran into a car February 15 and was clubbed to death by a motorist wielding a hockey stick. This was on Langstaff Road.
Another fell victim to a farmer's 12-gauge shotgun February 14 in fields behind the Villa Hospital, Bathurst Street.
The marksman was Ray Winger, a life-long resident. Both he and his father had never seen wolves in the area before. Mr. Winger's farm home is on Bathurst Street, Lot 12, Concession 2.
Discovery of the wolves probably has solved the mystery of 10 or 12 missing sheep last fall, and removed suspicion from the local dog population.
Mr. Winger says a neighbor, John Baker had trouble with sheep being killed in the pastures last fall. The wolf shot was described by Mr. Winger as a 40-pound brush wolf about one year old and about the size of an average German Shepherd dog. He has applied for a \$25 York County bounty.
Farmer Winger thinks the wolves may be breeding in the swamps that run south from behind the Honey Pot Ski Lodge to Carrville Road. They are really a rarity in this area and are hard to find until winter. There were no tracks and they didn't show up in the summer. Now they show against the snow and their tracks are evident.
He saw three wolves February 7 and shot one about 100 yards from the same spot a week later. Two got away.

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Extension Of Franchise Needs
Approval Of The Existing Voters
A bylaw will be prepared to extend municipal voting privileges to all residents of Richmond Hill who are 21 years of age and over and Canadian citizens, as provided for in the Municipal Franchise Extension Act, following an affirmative vote on a motion by Councillors Lois Hancey and David Schiller at Monday night's council meeting.
The proposed extension must be approved by a vote of the present eligible voters and it is planned to place it on the ballot at the next municipal election, slated for December 1971. (By that time it is expected that some sort of regional government for this area will have been introduced and the municipality of Richmond Hill may well not exist as such. However, it could be expected that with a bylaw in existence the new governing body would give it consideration.)
Mrs. Hancey described the present eligibility requirements of property ownership or tenancy as a carryover of medieval thinking. "Municipal funds no longer come from property only. Everyone contributes in some way and should have some say," she contended.

Investigations Underway
22 Horses, Donkey Dead After Fires
A series of three barn fires in Southern York County in the past two weeks has raised the suspicions of local fire officials. But no definite evidence of arson has been found.
Investigator Ken Pipher of the Ontario Fire Marshall's office says he found nothing conclusive at the scene of the \$16,000 Bayview fire that killed 22 riding horses and a donkey in the early hours of Friday February 13.
On February 14 at 7:45 pm a vacant barn burned on 8th Avenue South, near Woodbridge, in what Vaughan Township Fire Chief James Davidson described as a suspicious fire.
Two weeks ago another vacant barn burned near Maple. Investigator Pipher said he doubted if anything conclusive would be found in the ashes of the Bayview Avenue barn of Half Mile Ranch, because of the amount of fire damage. The barn stood at the end of a lane about one-third of a mile from Bayview, opposite Our Lady Help of Christians Separate School. The fire was at a safe distance from the ranch tackroom and living quarters which are located in the former farmhouse.
The Half Mile Ranch property owner is Myer Revitz of Washington, D.C. It could not immediately be determined if the barn was insured. The property was leased to Eric Saunders of 463 Centre Street East, a former operator of the ranch business. Mr. Saunders had sublet to Bruce Rennie, resident manager.
The only insurance the ranch operator had was \$1,000 on the contents of the barn. There was no insurance on the horses. Most of the saddles and equipment were in the tackroom at the house.
An antique Toronto bread wagon was destroyed in a garage adjacent to the barn. Richmond Hill firemen arrived in time to pull an automobile to safety.
One of this year's worst blizzards had ended the day before the fire. The ranch lane was plugged with snowbanks and parked vehicles. There was no hope of reaching the barn with fire trucks.
Richmond Hill Fire Chief Alf Stong said the building was doomed before the fire was reported. As in the previous barn
