Thornhill Lions Club was chartered in 1948 and since that time has made many contributions to the village. The first project was the \$100,000 swimming pool in the village park, which has provided enjoyment and healthful recreation for a wide area for more than two decades - besides teaching thousands of children to swim and water safety rules.

Present plans are to add gymnastic play equipment to the park's facilities in the spring.

Included in the club's community service through the years have been substantial donations to York Central Hospital, to Thornhaven, the summer camp for the blind in Muskoka, and to the renovating and refurbishing of Heintzman House. The Lions have also provided a shelter at the conservation pond and have cleared the ice for skating, have assisted Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies, made a beauty spot of the little parkette at the corner of Yonge Street and Centre Street and carried on a full welfare program. Besides this they conduct the annual Easter Seal Campaign which raises a substantial sum of money for crippled children, provide a scholarship at Thornhill Secondary School, sponsor a public speaking contest, and a July 1 celebration for the village.




