Town Park, Traffic, Parking Criticized

is over regulated. President Frank Murphy of the Legion International Midget Hockey Tournament scheduled for the school winter holiday told "The Liberal" in an interview this week.

The new parking and traffic regulations in the vicinity of the arena provide for entrance only from Church Street and exit by Pugsley Avenue. One-way traffic is permitted from Church Street to east of the arena and two-way from there to Pugsley. Parking and traffic are a regular shambles and seven prime parking spaces are reserved for staff and parking instead tournament week, but with conditions as they are I won't be able to. This means that the town will have to assign two policemen to that area for 10-12 hours a day for the full eight days."

"I intend to carry on the fight in the right way and will appear before council at its next meeting to ask council to rescind these regulations," Mr. Murphy con-

Mr. Murphy was at Richmond Hill Town Council meeting February 16 when Deputy-reeve Ivan Mansbridge failed in an attempt to have a motion passed that council recommend to the parks board that it rescind one-way traffic in the town park and request that bus and staff parking be confined to the parking area. His motion was seconded by Reeve Donald Plaxton.

Speaking to his motion, Mr. Mansbridge stated that the one-way regulation running into a two-way area without any designating sign is causing a lot of confusion. He questioned if an emergency vehicle could get through Church Street to reach the arena when crowds are attending hockey games or other presentations.

"As your representative on the police commission, I must emphasize that if you have bylaws, the police should do their duty," commented Mayor William Laof the paying public. I in- zenby. are in the wrong position." "If parking and no parking areas are not clearly marked, people have a legitimate complaint if their vehicles are ticketed," the mayor noted.

Mr. Mansbridge agreed that the police are doing a good job and the proper signs are now up. "I've had a chance to study the situatio when I take my son to play hockey and when I attend the hockey games and I firmly believe that the oneway road in front of the arenas is not working satisfactorily."

"I'm very glad people have noticed the change in regulations," commented Councillor Shaun Beggs, who serves on the park and recreation committee. "We introduced these at the request of the arena board. So far we have had only one letter of complaint. As for parking only seven parking spots are under question - five for the cars of staff and two bus bays out of 300."

"Before the new arena was built there was only oneeighth of present parking available. We have taken

emergency vehicles. The police were not in favor of traffic coming out of the park on to Church Street." he explained.

"If men who are interested in recreation cannot walk a little distance from their parked cars to the arena, it is a sorry state of affairs. At Maple Leaf Gardens, in Toronto, not only do they have to walk but they have to pay for the privilege of parking in the vincinity. However, if the arena board wants to change these regulations we will concede to their request," he assured council, "An ornamental gateway is being designed to lead into the one-way road."

Councillor Eric George agreed with those who believe the one-way entrance is of poor design. He felt that moving the buses from their present location would not improve matters much, however, since it would provide parking for only two more cars (one for each bus bay).

Commenting on Councillor Beggs' remark about the increase in parking facilities, Mr. Murphy pointed out that the new arena is attracting many more people to use the parking spaces. Minor hockey registration is up 20% this year and the midget hockey tournament, to be held on eight days this year, will tax the present parking to the limit.
