Value, Reward Must Go Together Victoria & Grey President Says

With Canada's gross national product growth close to a standstill the country's prosperity will not improve until there is a return to the recognition that value and reward must go hand in hand, President Walter E. Harris, QC, of Markdale, told shareholders at the 1970 annual meeting of Victoria and Grey Trust Company. This was the company's 80th annual meeting.

During his address, Mr. Harris expressed opinions on inflation, taxes, tight money and affairs of the company.

He stated it will be hard to duplicate in 1970 last year's progress and said today's rate of growth in business is not as fast as it was six months ago.

Commenting on inflation, Mr. Harris said, "As far as our business is concerned the effects are being felt now and we don't have to wait for them."

Referring to the mortgage business, an important phase of the company's operations, he reported that traditionally it has always tried to operate on a margin of about two percent. With the cost of money at 8 3/4% he said the company has had to reduce this spread.

"Unless interest rates decline substantially in 1970, the burden of the smaller spread will be borne by the shareholders alone," he warned. "There is evidence there will be more than a modest decline in rates. The effects of action against inflation are here now for Victoria & Grey, we are paying a price for fighting inflation and no appeal is necessary to us

to use voluntary restraint."

Touching on the federal government's White Paper on taxation, Mr. Harris stated the scheme proposals, radical departures from the existing system, were presented as a preliminary to stimulate public discussion.

"Taxation is never logical or scientific," he claimed. "It is merely the need of government to finance itself by whatever means are available with the actual, if grumbling, support of the public generally."

Mr. Harris recalled that many years ago people were taxed on the number of stores, number of windows or number of chimneys in their homes. The system was effective simply because it taxed wealth where it was and could be easily collected.

Discussing the discrepancies in the proposed capital gains tax, Mr. Harris said if a person is seeking logic there it cannot be found. "I'm afraid I still think the income tax is the fairest tax of all," he said. "If the government feels it must have a capital gains tax, I hope it adopts something approaching the simplicity of the American system instead of the current proposal."

"With a large portfolio of Canadian stocks, it may be necessary to dispense with the tax. This could depress the market and work against the government's expressed desire to encourage ownership of Canadian stock," he asserted.

Concluding his address, Mr. Harris said, "Canada's forward reach will resume only when there is established a greater parity in return for effort contributed than is evident today. We, in this company, believe in the old-fashioned precept that value must be given for money received. It has always been, it will always be, the touchstone of the success of this company."

The financial report, presented by Secretary-Treasurer G. E. Phelps, Lindsay, disclosed the net profit for 1969 as \$2,157,481, up from \$1,829,012 in 1968. Total assets under administration were \$445,426,337 last year, compared to \$385,119,544 in 1968.

Question Park Site Cachet Country Club

Concern has arisen in Markham Township that 17.2 acres at land in the Cachet Country Club Subdivision is not going to be for use as a public park.

The subdivision is located off Don Mills Road, a short distance north of Buttonville.

The situation became apparent and caused alarm at a recent meeting of the committee of adjustment. The township planning board was informed.

Planning board is going to take the matter up with the developers.

The ownership of the land remains in the hands of the subdividers. Committee of adjustment was told by a Person Realty Ltd. representative that no parkland is intended to remain in the Cachet Subdivision.

"Recalling plans that were shown in the past and discussions with the late Richard Person, it was definitely made clear that certain lands shown were to remain open space common to all property owners in the development."

"If this is not so and division of the 17.2 acres is permitted, the township will end up with another area without public open space, along with the resulting hue and cry, complete with charges of poor planning," said Parks Manager Allan Sumner in a letter.

Person Realty Ltd., is seeking to proceed with further subdivision of lands owned in the Cachet Subdivision, and has indicated it has similar future plans for the Buttonwood Golf Club property.

SUMMARY TO BY-LAW NUMBER 3920
By-law 2523 provides that for the purpose of computing the yard and set back requirements on certain streets, the limit of the street shall be considered as the planned width of the road allowance which is provided in Schedule "B" to the By-law.

As a result of planning and traffic studies the Township, by Amendment No. 17 to the Official Plan, revised the planned widths of many of the public highways in the municipality. The purpose of this by-law is to implement the provisions of Amendment No. 17. Schedule "B" designates specific highways as expressways, arterial roads and collector roads. Any highway which is not within one of these categories has a planned width of 66 feet. Schedule "B" designates expressways with a planned width of 300', arterial roads with a planned width of 120' and collector roads with a planned width of 86'.

This is a true copy of the Schedule "B" attached to By-law 3920 with the exception that certain street names have been added for the purposes of identification.
