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Vaughan Historical Society

Publication of the history of Vaughan Township will be the first major project of the newly formed Vaughan Township Historical Society which will meet at 8 pm March 31 in the Joseph A. Gibson Public School.

The group plans to publish the collected research of Dr. Elmore Reaman, who died in December, the night before the first meeting of the society to start the planning.

All residents of the area are invited to the meeting, which will ratify the society's constitution. There will also be a film on flood control prepared by the Metro Conservation Authority.

In addition to publishing Dr. Reaman's history, the society hopes to promote and stimulate interest in the history and people of Vaughan and to support worthy movements and mark important landmarks and documents.

Honorary president is James McDonald, administrator and industrial commissioner of the township.

President is George Snider of Newmarket, formerly of Maple. Mr. Snider is a descendant of a pioneer Vaughan Township family and a member of the Pennsylvania German Folklore Society, which initiated the project.

Other officers include Vice-President Jesse Bryson; Secretary Charles Miller; Treasurer

Fred Constable; and Councilors Harold Hayhoe, Ernest Redelmsier, William Hollowell and Mrs. Pierre Berton.

The research committee includes Mrs. Everett Kellam, Mrs. Amos Baker, Mrs. Roy Barker and Mrs. Jessie Bryson.

Tweedsmuir conveners of a Women's Institute committee which is aiding in preparing the history for publication are Mrs. Dirk Vermeer and Miss Merle Hampley of Kleinburg; Mrs. James Thomson of Elder's Mill; Mrs. Harry Jackson of Maple and Mrs. Charles Agnew of South Vaughan. The Institute is custodian of Tweedsmuir History book which was used extensively by Dr. Reaman in his research.

JACKSON'S POINT: Two juveniles, aged 8 and 9, have been charged as juvenile delinquents in connection with nine fires, including some in expensive summer homes here. 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3 Woodbridge Area Plans Considered

For more than a year, Vaughan Township Council and Planning Board have been hearing presentations from developers with holdings on the periphery of Woodbridge. On February 2 council passed the following resolution:

"Be it resolved that the council of the Township of Vaughan instruct the planning board to immediately prepare secondary plans for the periphery of the Village of Woodbridge, including Blocks 44, 45 and 51."

At its March 16 meeting council outlined its reasons for the resolution after having had an opportunity to study cost-benefit figures on four development plans for the area.

planned for the area north of Highway 7. This excludes the Flinton Plan which lies south of that highway and since the cost-benefit analysis showed a negative result for this plan, council agreed with Woodbridge.

The West Woodbridge (Milani) Plan is close to the break-even point in municipal finances and it is believed arrangements can be made when the plan is being processed to add further industrial assessment so the plan will produce a financial return to the township.

The Beaton Plan shows a negative position in municipal financing which is offset by a large initial benefit to both the village and the township. This is a \$200,000 extension to the Islington Avenue trunk sewer which would make the entire Pine Grove community sewerable. An added advantage would

be development of a further water supply to the advantage of both municipalities. This would be based on a well located in the Boyd Conservation Area.

The Vroom Plan represents a partial infilling of residential property which is logical and desirable, Vaughan Council feels, and should be implemented as soon as an offsetting industrial assessment is provided to cover the negative financial return the plan shows in the cost-benefit analysis.

It was Vaughan Township's wish that the processing of these three plans (Vroom, Beaton and West Woodbridge) continue with the development of secondary plans while negotiations for additional sewerage capacity are continued with officials of Metro.

Councillor Gordon Risk informed council he had been informed that Metro Works Department is giving favorable consideration to the township's request for additional sewerage capacity and its staff is proceeding to check out what is available.

Councillor David Fraser commented that "the real purpose of this exercise is to let these people know where we stand, so they can go ahead and develop their plans. It is only fair to say there is nothing wrong with the development of these plans when they have passed planning board."
