Guest speaker was Mrs. Elmer Leek, who gave a very inspiring message for both the girls and their mothers.

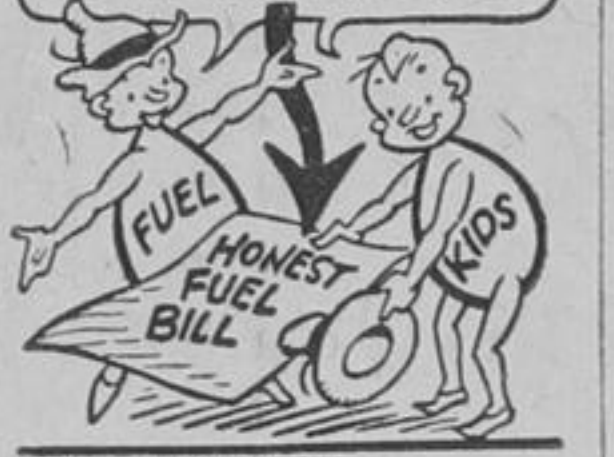

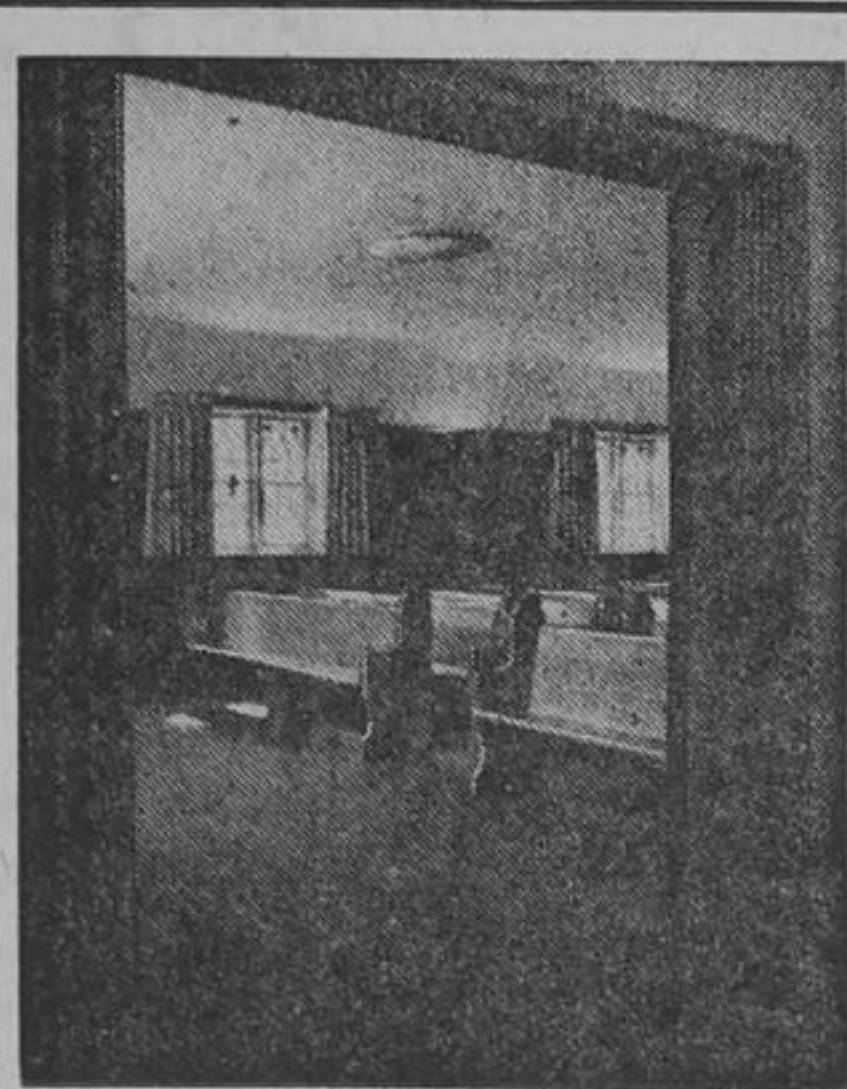


