

NOTICE FIRE REGULATIONS

Department of Energy and Resources Management Air Management Branch Pollution Control - Bonfires Excerpts from Ontario Regulations 133/70

Section 11

(1) Subject to Subsection 2 No person shall burn or permit to be burned any material in an open fire that may contribute to air pollution, except with the permission and under the direction of a Provincial Officer.

(2) A person may burn or permit to be burned material in an open fire where the fire is for recreational purposes, provided that the fire does not contribute to air pollution.
