 David Oullette, 17, of 450 Judaea Court, Richmond Hill, at last report was in critical condition at York Central Hospital with multiple injuries after a Sunday midnight two-car crash at Markham Road and Concession 3.
 The youth was pried out of his small foreign make car by the Vaughan Township Fire Department's rescue squad.
 Four other people suffered injuries in the accident.
 Mr. Oullette suffered a ruptured spleen, fractured right liver and contusions to the left lung, according to Markham Township Police.
 One of his passengers, John Wood, 17, of RR 1, Richmond Hill suffered a concussion and cervical strain.
 Another passenger, Paul McNulty, 17, of 306 South Taylor Mills Drive, suffered cervical strain.
 Donald Matthews, 21, of Lot 28, Concession 4, Markham Township (RR 2, Gormley), was driving the other car involved in the accident. He had a bump on the head and a sore wrist.
