Award Contract For Underground Portion Sheppard Ave. Subway

The Toronto Transit Commission last week awarded a \$5,988,144 contract to the Foundation Company of Canada Limited for construction of the Sheppard Station on the Eglinton Subway northern extension.

The company's bid was the lowest of six. Tenders ranged as high as \$7,296,000.

The tender was awarded despite Metro's Transportation Committee's earlier deferral of several weeks for approval of the design of the station.

North York Controller Irving Paisley wanted time to check with his borough's planning officials to determine whether they had been consulted on design.

Ralph Day, chairman of the TTC, told the committee that such a delay would upset the construction schedule for the subway.

Day said last week that there was no conflict between the recent commission's action and that of the transportation committee.

The structure for which the contract was awarded is primarily underground, he said, and its design was approved two years ago.

The section referred to by the transportation committee involved surface structures such as bus bays.
