Bryan has competed in track for three years - i.e. since grade 9. He states that the only reason that he started off in running was because he "wanted to participate in school sports".

He not only runs for the school, but he also runs for the Etobicoke Track Club. Bryan has chosen to specialize in the 440 and 880 yard runs. Of these he prefers the half-mile because it is more exciting and offers a greater challenge.

Although he is frequently a half-mile man on the relay teams, his coach, Doug McCammon, seems to feel that Bryan runs a better individual race. However, Bryan does not mind running on the relay teams. His reason?? "I like to run."

This young man is not only a star during track season, but also during cross-country in the fall. Apparently Bryan really enjoys crosscountry running. (I can't say that I blame him.) He does feel that it is hard — most races for his age group are around three miles - but because it's running, he doesn't mind the length of the race. Cross-country is also excellent training for an 880 man. Although speed is not emphasized, endurance is. Now I'm not saying that Bryan is good at the 880 because he runs cross-country. I am saying, however, that through cross-country, he and other runners are building up endurance -resistance to fatigue.

An 880 runner must give all he can throughout the entire race, and this is when the training he has obtained in cross-country is used to its fullest capacity and to his best advantage.

Bryan is definitely not a one-sport man. He played halfback for the football team, plays basketball, ice hockey, participates in swimming and just about every other sport, including KARATE. So far Bryan has won a hockey trophy and a cross-country trophy plus 23 ribbons for track. I'd say that he was doing all right for himself. Doug McCammon feels that Bryan has a lot of potential. According to him, Bryan is "co-operative, coachable, dedicated, and hardworking. Because of these fine qualities he could develop into a very good runner."

Langstaff's young athlete is pretty well satisfield with high school sports. The only thing he would like to see is "a few more meets because there is some great potential in the high schools of this area."

Bryan recently ran in the Georgian Bay Track Meet and he qualified for the All-Ontario Track Meet, in the 400 metre run. On hehalf of the Zone 6 coaches and athletes, I wish Bryan the best of luck in this upcoming race, and every other race he runs in the future.


