Thornhill Area Residents Protest Loudly As Their Taps Run Dry On many days in recent

weeks the taps have run dry in Thornhill and adjacent urban areas of Markham Township.

And many are the residents who cried over a sink full of dirty dishes in the evenings.

Township officials maintain that citizen co-operation can eliminate the problem entirely this year.

And a crash program by the municipality will double the available water reserve to 6,000,000 gallons per day by late summer.

New facilities were to have been ready to meet the summer peak demand this year. However, there were just too many details and Ontario Water Resources Commission procedures to get through.

Additional water will be available later in the summer if work already underway goes according to plan. So says Township Engineer Dipen Mukherjee.

* * * *

Last week township council received a delegation of 16th Avenue residents. This is probably the area which has suffered the worst from the water shortage.

Spokesman Al Kehrli of 141 Sixteenth Avenue, said his area had water trouble for the last four years, and the trouble has been getting worse and worse.

"Last night it was sickening," he told council. "I brought my wife home from the airport. We wanted some tea. But the dirty dishes were stacked in the sink and there

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




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
