This first election in the new York Region is going to be operated and paid for by the province.

Markham Returning Officer Harry Crisp says work has already begun on revising the voters' lists, which must be printed and posted by August 7.

In each new municipality of the new York Region the procedure has been to name the clerk of the larger former municipalities as returning officer. Where two former municipalities smaller municipality be-

comes the election assistant. The returning officer names a deputy returning officer and the poll clerks. He is also responsible for establishing the polling

Returning Officer Crisp was named deputy-clerk of Markham Township in 1956. He became clerk - treasurer in 1957, succeeding the late Charles Hoover in the post. He is now the clerk of the municipality, a separate job having been created for a township treasurer as the township grew.

Before coming to Markham Township, Mr. Crisp was employed for several years at Upper Canada College, where he was assistant treasurer. He served in the armed forces for 41/2 years during World War 2.

Mr. Crisp has lived at 191 Henderson Avenue, Thornhill, since 1961. He previously resided in an area of Markham Township that was annexed to the Town of Markham.
