Any rooms? Mrs. Mary Brodie of the Richmond Hill Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses shares in the search for accommodation for many of the delegates to the "Men of Goodwill" District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses to be held at Woodbine Racetrack July 30 to August 2. To supplement commercial facilities in the busy summer season more than 3,000 Watch Tower Convention representatives are now covering Metro to list available rooms in private homes. About 16,000 delegates are expected to attend from Southern Ontario.

Expect 16,000 At Jehovah's Convention

A Richmond Hill housewife, Mrs. Mary Brodie, is helping to prepare for thousands of guests on the four-day weekend of July 30 to August 2. She is part of a task force of 3,000 workers from 12 local centres searching the area for spare-room accommodation in homes in the Toronto area. The occasion is the four-day "Men of Goodwill" District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses to be held at Woodbine Racetrack. About 16,000 delegates are expected to attend from all parts of Southern Ontario. All available motel and hotel rooms have been booked for several months, but further accommodation is needed. This is being sought in private homes in the area.

Mrs. Brodie knows that, "Not many families have an absolutely spare unused bedroom, but most families can accommodate guests for a few days. Children can double up or a recreation room can be used for sleeping. We're more than willing to pay for any accommodation offered, and we know that making accommodation available is an expression of hospitality on the part of any householder, and we appreciate it."

Response to date has been gratifying but more accommodation is needed. Mrs. Brodie comments that "It's an excellent opportunity for any family to practice love and hospitality and to inject a wholesome influence into family life. It's amazing sometimes how the presence of Christians from outside the family can be an influence for good."

Purpose of the assembly is to provide Bible instruction for a better understanding of fulfillment of Biblical prophecy, application of the principles of the Bible to a greater degree in everyday life, training for a more efficient public ministry to neighbors, general encouragement to all interested in becoming and remaining persons who have God's goodwill for life eternal in a new order of His making.

One of the features of Jehovah's Witnesses is the large number of young people in active membership. One of these is William Coulter, 21, associate minister of the Richmond Hill congregation and on the staff at the Watch Tower headquarters in Toronto. He puts it this way: "We believe in social justice and equality, but we know from history that social upheaval isn't the way to get these things. We want peace and we're preaching it, but history argues revolution and violence won't accomplish it. Certainly not permanently. As to demonstrations, they're useful only if they demonstrate something exemplary. We believe that the way we live daily demonstrates that peace works — now! Jehovah's Witnesses have an international reputation for non-violence."

Moreland Whiffs 19 In Final Game

Baker's Boys Consolation Winners At Woodstock Squirt Tournament

Richmond Hill Baker's Sales won their final four games after losing the first one to win the consolation series of the first annual Woodstock Squirt Tournament held July 11.

Their only loss was to a powerful Woodstock "A" entry that downed them 13-5.

Richmond Hill then went on to upend Woodstock "B's" 3-2, Galt 8-3, and Sarina 5-0 in the final game.

The opening game saw Baker's surprise the favored Woodstock squad by taking a 2-0 lead only to fall behind 5-2 and then tying it 5-5 on Randy Martin's three run homer.

From there on in Woodstock took over and won going away. Paul Philip pitched five and two third innings for Baker's yielding all 13 runs and allowing 12 hits. Errors also hurt his cause. Lorne Davidson pitched the final one and a third innings allowing one hit.

Glen Moreland scored two runs for Baker's with Greg MacMillan, Pete Tipold and Martin getting the others.

The Hillers bounced back in the second game to down Woodstock's second team 5-2 behind the five hit pitching of Moreland who also struck out 10 batters.

Baker's scored four runs in the first inning and from there on in coasted to the win.

MacMillan contributed a double while Rick Berezowski scored two runs with singletons credited to Steve Bond, Dale Strang, and Tipold. Dave Baker and MacMillan each had one runs-batted-in.

It was much the same story in their 8-3 win over Galt which they scored seven runs in the first three innings.

Moreland pitched three innings of hitless ball with Philip tossing the other four allowing Galt's three runs on four hits.

MacMillan drove home two runs with Tipold and Strang each knocking in one. Tipold scored three times, Chris DeGeer twice, with Dave Forbes, Berezowski, Philip and Martin and Philip each plating one.

Regular league action Tuesday night of last week (July 14) saw Baker's cakewalking to a 17-4 over Stouffville in Stouffville collecting 17 hits enroute.

Moreland pitched a one hit-ter over five innings allowing no runs and striking out nine batters. Philip pitched one inning allowing four runs on three hits.

Brad Lloyd hit a home run and a double while Steve Bond and DeGeer each had doubles. Moreland and Lloyd each knocked in three runs with Bond, Strang and DeGeer contributing two. Single rbi's went Galt's three runs on four hits.

Tipold scored five times, runs with Tipold and Strang each knocking in one. Tipold scored three times, Chris DeGeer twice, with Dave Forbes, Berezowski, Philip and Martin and Philip each plating one.

The final game win by 5-0 over Sarina was featured by the 19-strikeout pitching of Moreland out of a possible 21. He allowed only three hits and struck out the side in order in the fourth, fifth, and sixth inning. At one juncture he struck out 13 consecutive opponents.

The Sarnia hurler was also excellent and the game was scoreless until the third inning when Tipold beat out a bunt, stole second and then third, and came home on a wild pitch.

This ended the scoring until the seventh inning when DeGeer walked and then stole second. He kept on running to score as the catcher's throw went into the outfield. Philip then reached first on an error. Steve Bond singled and Forbes hit a lousy triple bringing them home. Strang then singled home Forbes for the 5-0 win.

Forbes accepted the handsome trophy and crests on behalf of his team. Syd Moreland managed the team.
