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\$95,000 Federal Loan Sr. Citizens' Housing

Robert Andras, Minister Responsible for Housing, announced this week the approval of a \$95,000 federal loan for the construction of a senior citizen's housing project in Unionville.

Provided under the National Housing Act, the loan will be made to the Bethany Lodge, a non-profit corporation sponsored by several businessmen who are associated with 15 congregations of local gospel halls. The loan is for a term of 50 years with interest at 7 1/2 per cent.

The loan will assist in the construction of a single and two-storey building containing accommodation for 34 elderly persons in 16 single and nine double rooms. Apart from a dining room and other facilities, the building will also contain an auditorium, a chapel, an area for crafts and a large lounge.

The loan is made under a section of the National Housing Act which provides long-term loans to non-profit corporations for the construction or acquisition and conversion of housing projects.

Clinic At Buttonwood Aids Arthritis Group

York Central Branch, Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society, is richer by \$170, the result of a golf clinic held at Buttonwood Golf Club, June 23.

Miss Elizabeth Flood, branch chairman, stated that the society was most grateful to the golf course, and to Ernest Nerlich, who organized and conducted the clinic.

The clinic was a part of the fund-raising activities of the branch, which is centred in Richmond Hill. Revenues are devoted to research, patient care and public and professional education. The main effort of the local branch will be a door-to-door canvass during September, "Arthritis Month."
