But who really wants Richmond Hill and area — in fact the whole region since we share all costs now — to stop growing in population. Certainly not the existing businessmen that Mr. Mansbridge spoke of.

(7) Mr. Mansbridge would like to leave the decision on whether or not BAIF proceeds to the new Regional Government, but he should know that this plan commenced its negotiations in 1965 and eventually the developers secured a commitment from the Province of Ontario that the sewage treatment plant, to accompany the development, would be permitted. To have some organization suddenly attempt to shut the door (if that is what Mr. Mansbridge is hoping for) on BAIF would be grossly unfair. I submit that it is "DESIGN FOR DEVELOPMENT: THE TO-

ONTARIO CENTRED REGION" that will be the basis for decision on growth in the region. A careful reading of that plan would suggest that the only way in which growth in Richmond Hill, Provincial Government authorities will be expanding on the guidelines set out in that report.

(8) Mr. Mansbridge states, "If it is allowed to go ahead, I firmly believe the present town is going to suffer from the effect it will have on our merchants." I humbly submit that the proposed commercial development will be in Richmond Hill and therefore it will also represent "out merchants". Further, I fail to understand how the town is going to suffer and I am now speaking of the vast public not included as "our merchants". The public will be the recipient of greater competition and a much wider range of items for purchase.

I appreciate Mr. Mansbridge's concern and I know it is sincere, but like so many other things, his concern apparently stems from a lack of full knowledge of the facts. Having been a member of Vaughan Township Planning Board for the last 18 months it is my view that Richmond Hill will be proud of this new development tailored to meet the needs of an expanding population. I would be pleased to discuss this with those who have lingering doubts about the proposed plan.

## Wife's Condition Critical

# Motorcyclist Dies On King Sideroad

A motorcyclist died, his wife was very critically injured and several other people were injured in accidents on Southern York County's local roads last week.

Dead after a three vehicle collision at 2:13 pm August 1 on the King Sideroad at Concession 2 is William Loveys, 43, of Flowertown Avenue, Brampton. His wife was last reported in very critical condition in Toronto General Hospital.

The wife and child of one of the other drivers in the collision were injured. Mrs. Jacqueline Cummings, 21, of 1762 Keele Street, Toronto, suffered head lacerations and bruises. Her 18 month old son, Michael, suffered bruises when he was thrown out of the car. Driver Brian Cummings, 23, had an estimated \$3,500 damage to his late model car, and head lacerations.

Damage to the motorcycle was estimated at \$2,500.

The third vehicle was driven by James Priest, 19, of 371 Woodsworth Road, Willowdale. He had whiplash and a bruised forehead, with an estimated \$800 damage. The investigating officer was Constable Bernie Harris of King Township Police.

The Cummings car was westbound on the King Sideroad and collided with the Priest vehicle that was southbound on Concession 2 and came through a stop sign.

Charges are pending, three people were injured, and damage was estimated at a total of \$3,500 in an 8:20 am August 4 two-car collision at 18th Avenue and Concession 3 in Markham Township.

William Bailey, 27, of 36 Millard Avenue, Newmarket, had cuts and abrasions and an estimated \$2,000 damage to his car. Mrs. Gayle Bailey suffered head injury and bruises to her legs and shoulder. The Bailey vehicle was southbound on Concession 3 at a stop sign.

The other driver was Karl Henkel, 42, of 20 Valley Crest Avenue, Markham, and he had back cuts, neck injury, facial and arm cuts. He was westbound on 18th Avenue. His car had an estimated \$1,500 damage. Markham Township Police said.

Damage was heavy to a King City car July 31 in a collision at Dufferin Street and Carrville Road, Richvale, in Vaughan Township.

In another, but rather unusual, accident in Vaughan Township, Mrs. Anne Trella of RR 1, Maple, suffered three broken ribs.

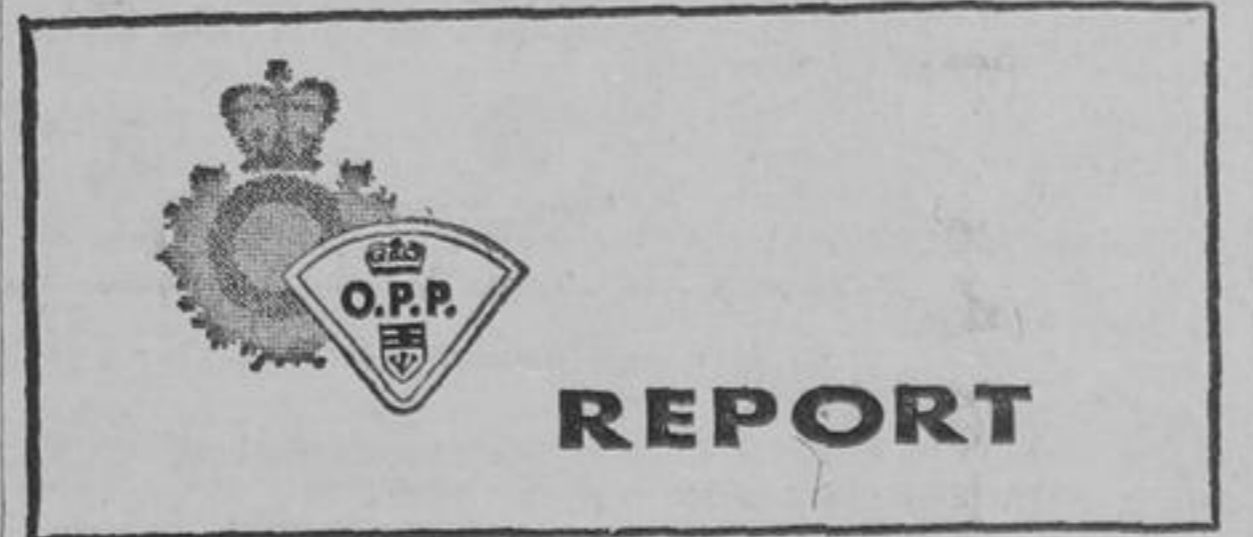

August 1 in a collision at Steeles and Cactus Avenues in Vaughan Township, Stella Waldron of Toronto had an estimated \$300 damage to her car. The other driver, Robert Patterson of Toronto, had \$600 damage. Vaughan Police estimated.

## Burglaries And Thefts Cost \$2,300 In Total

Four break-ins and two thefts involving a total loss estimated at more than \$2,300 were reported in Vaughan Township last week.

## Born In Whitchurch, Industrialist Samuel Fingold 59 Dies Suddenly

Samuel Fingold, a Toronto industrialist born in Whitchurch Township, died suddenly Sunday, August 2, at his country home at Roches Point in North Gwillimbury. He was 59.

An entrepreneur at the age of 11, Mr. Fingold organized a staff of 20 electricians to do

house and barn wiring when electricity came to the Lemonville farm community where he lived as a boy, but he did not jump into the corporate limelight until the early 1960's when he completed a series of successful take-over bids in the commercial arena.

In his early 20's, Mr. Fingold was a discount store operator in Aurora and opened stores in Kincardine, Barrie and Midland in the next seven years.

In 1937 he bought the Roxy Theatre in Mount Forest north of Guelph and is still remembered there as a fine tennis and baseball player.

In the next 20 years he built or bought two more movie theatres a year in Southern Ontario. Between 1956 and 1957 he sold most of them to Odeon Theatres (Canada) Ltd. but retained a full scale theatre projection room where he showed about 25 new films a year, often before they appeared in Toronto theatres. His home was also noted for its fine collection of antiques.

After selling his independent movie circuit, Mr. Fingold bought seats on most of the Canadian and U.S. commodity exchanges to accumulate capital through the international commodity trading markets.

He then acquired, in what was described as a series of "mysterious biddings", N. Slater Company Limited, a Hamilton-based manufacturer of stampings, forgings and other metal products. In 1960, and Burlington Steel Company in 1961, amalgamating the two to form Slater Steel Industries Limited.

He acquired the Foundation group of construction and engineering companies in the spring of 1962, and topped his record of financial accomplishments by gaining control of Salada Foods Limited in 1966.

Mr. Fingold said at the time that he became interested in the N. Slater Company primarily as an investment and also as something to occupy his time.

The Canadian Foundation Company, which with its subsidiaries, was Canada's largest engineering and construction company, and Salada Foods Limited, Canada's largest food-processing concern, were sold to Janin and Company Limited of Montreal, and Kellogg's of Battle Creek, Michigan.

Mr. Fingold leaves his wife, Sidney; two sons, John Paul and David Bruce; a brother, Harvey, and two sisters, Rose Pullman and Shirley Albright.
