New Schools For 3 Woodbridge Area Subdivisions Would Cost \$5,934,200

About 2,836 children of school age will be moving into the Woodbridge area if three plans for residential development now before Vaughan Township Planning Board are approved and built.

At a meeting on July 6, York County Board of Education was told it would have to provide three new elementary schools and a large addition to Woodbridge High School to accommodate the new school population.

Based on studies of similar development, staff estimates that these developments will produce 1,640 junior elementary students, 470 senior elementary students (grades 7 and 8) and 726 secondary students.

Planning staff population projections indicate the Vroom plan for the area immediately east of Woodbridge will produce 590 junior pupils, 170 senior pupils and 266 at the secondary level, and that it will cost about \$2,152,200 to provide new school accommodation for the area.

The development, covering 632 acres, is planned for an area north of Highway 7 on the easterly and northerly boundaries of the Village of Woodbridge.

Directly north of the Vroom development there is the Beaton plan for a 1,003 acre subdivision west of Pine Valley Drive and south of Elder Mills Sideroad.

This project would bring in 310 junior school pupils, 90 senior pupils and 128 requiring secondary school accommodation at a cost to the board of about \$1,094,000.

Because of the distance from the school, students would have to be bused to Woodbridge High School at a cost of about \$10,000 a year.

The third, the Milani plan, covers 885 acres north of Highway 7 and immediately west of Woodbridge. The staff report to the trustees estimates an influx of 740 junior, 210 senior and 332 secondary school students in this area, with the cost of school construction required estimated at \$2,687,400.

Total cost of required school construction if the three plans are developed would be \$5,934,200.

Any one of the plans would require an addition to Woodbridge High School which was built in 1958, has a capacity of 360 students, and enrolment for September anticipated at 319.

The three plans would treble the number of students at the school, which would then probably become a composite secondary school offering commercial and vocational courses.

At present, the school has only academic classes and students requiring vocational or commercial courses are bused to Thornhill or Langstaff Secondary Schools.

VAUGHAN TOWNSHIP HYDRO-ELECTRIC SYSTEM

announces, with regret, that continuing increase in costs have produced the necessity of an increase in rates for electricity. A thorough rate study, done in co-operation with Ontario Hydro, indicates than an average increase of 5.9%, effective on billings after October 1st, 1970, will stabilize our rates two years. Deferring the effective date would require a higher percentage increase. Approval was therefore sought, and received from Ontario Hydro for the following rate schedule, which will be effective October 1st, 1970.

Frank Robson Works For Children His Interest Is Reciprocated

One of the most active and community minded residents of the Maple area is Frank Robson of Lancer Drive. Frank's main interest lies in the children of the community. Large and small they return that interest with almost hero worship.

Mr. Robson is active in the Maple Lions Club, where he is on the boys' and girls' committee and the parks committee.

He is deeply involved in Scouts and Cubs, and since he has had no formal training in Scouting, he sticks to his specialty which is camping.
Although he recently sold his farm on Concession 7, Vaughan (Purpleville), he retained rights to the sugar bush and the Scouts camp which he has made available for years, and for which he has some exciting plans for the future. The sugar bush is a beehive of activity in the spring when the sap is running, when busloads of youngsters and adults visit "Robson's Bush" for a look at maple syrup making. Frank has plans to set up the five different processes of obtaining syrup from maple sap, so that the whole history of maple products can be on display. Included will be the method the Indians used, complete with one of Canada's natives in full dress on hand to demonstrate.

Frank has a driving interest in history, including the methods the pioneers used to conquer the wilderness in early Canada, as well as his own family history. He has recently traced the Robson name back to the 1560's when it originated in Scotland.

Frank attributes some of his interest in community affairs to his father, James Henry Robson, who was the secretary-treasurer of the Purpleville School Section for 30 years and a former member of Vaughan Township Council. We have been told that the Maple Recreation Association (MRA), with George Bailey the first acting president, was formed in Frank Robson's garage. For many years Frank had a service station in Maple, first on the west side of Keele, in the area of the old Post Office and then across the road (the Texaco station on the corner before the widening of Keele Street).

Frank is in his 10th year as village trustee. He served his first six years with Roly Keffer and Jim Hodgson, and now serves with Fred Young and Bruce Thurston. In this capacity Frank is again able to

work in the interests of the youngsters. He also works with the Maple Area Recreation Committee (MARC). He is careful to tell us that he doesn't hold office on the committee, but helps out when he can.

Frank has a mechanical ability which leans toward the inventive. He used this to advantage to make the first cone threshing machine and then proceeded to improve on the original to cut costs in half. We must admit that we were surprised to know that evergreen cones are harvested and threshed.

It was Frank's mechanical ability that he contributed during his army service and it was in that service that he suffered the accident in which he lost his left hand. Even this, which most people would consider a severe handicap, Frank has used to advantage in dealing with his young friends. He kids them about being Captain Hook and teaches them a valuable lesson in acceptance of handicaps in themselves and others.

Frank is also a member of Teston United Church. His wife, Marion (Formerly Marion Watson of Maple) helps and goes along with Frank in all of his projects and dreams. They have a family of two, Brenda, going into grade 12 at Langstaff Secondary School and Jimmy in grade 5 at Joseph A. Gibson Public School.
