Lex Mackenzie Honored On Provincial Plaque

In his address Mr. Gomme pointed out that the history of this rich agricultural commu-

ity goes back to the very begin-nings of the province.

"It was here, after the Amer-ican Revolution, that sturdy Pennsylvania Germans took up land. In 1828, their numbers were increased by the arrival of the Selkirk settlers, whose des-cendants are still found here-abouts.

"These people, among other things, established Toronto's St. Lawrence Market long be-fore Confederation. It still flourishes. And so does Holland Marsh, thanks in part to a fresh addition of Dutch-speaking people after World War II," the Minister stated.

He went on to point out that to meet the demands of this growing economy, better roads were needed. The section of Highway 9 from Highway 27 to Highway 400 was still a town-ship road until 1964 when it was taken over by the province and was declared a King's Highway on October 6, 1966.

Work on its reconstruction was begun May 1, 1969 by E. & E. Seegmiller Ltd. of Kitchener and included three overpasses, at Highway 400, at the Holland Marsh Canal and at the Schom-berg River.

Total cost of the 3.57-mile section was \$1,745,504, includ-ing construction of a 10-bay Holland Marsh Patrol Yard. Materials used included 21-500 tons of asphalt, 583,000 tons of earth excavated and 168,000 tons of sand cushion.

The method used to build the road bed through the swamp area was an interesting one. Draglines were used to exca-vate the swamp and a special

disposal area was provided to hold the silt while it dried. Then this material was used to raise the right-of-way five feet through the low-lying area.

In addition to seeding more than 44 acres of the right-of-way, using the hydra-seeder-mulch blower method, DHO crews laid 195,000 cubic yards of top soil and 8,650 yards of sodding.

Special jute matting was laid in some areas to combat erosion caused by surface runoff. Fu-ture landscaping plans will compliment the landscaping on Highway 400.

"This makes it a modern, highly convenient marketing road. Access can be gained from all parts of the marsh and at either end it connects with high speed arteries running south, east and west," Mr. Gomme noted.

He concluded by announcing that another million-dollar project to reconstruct Highway 9 west from Highway 27 for 8.76 miles to Highway 50 has al-ready begun.

Tribute was paid to "Lex" Mackenzie by Deputy Minister McNab. He told the assembled guests that Major Mackenzie was born at Woodbridge on November 1, 1885, and continued to live in the house which had sheltered his ancestors for more than 140 years. He was the great-great-grandson of the early arctic explorer, Alexander Mackenzie.

York County's Grand Old Man was awarded the Military Cross by George V for bravery above and beyond the call of

duty for his part in the Battle of the Somme and was wounded at Vimy Ridge in 1917.

After serving as councillor and reeve in Woodbridge from 1922 to 1935 he was elected to the Ontario Legislature in 1945 and continued to be re-elected at every election until his re-tirement from active politics during 1967, at the age of 82. He died this spring after an illness of several months dura-tion.

During his years in the Legis-lature, Major Mackenzie exhib-ited an interest in all his con-stituents and their problems, lending a willing hand where-ever needed, and won the ad-miration and respect, not only of his colleagues, but of all who knew him.

It was fitting that this plaque should commemorate his con-tribution to the area of which he was always a stalwart champion. He was also a strong fighter for local rights.
