#### 51 Yr. Old Jersey Herd On Sale Today

Today, Thursday, one of the oldest herds of Jersey cattle in York County goes under the auctioneer's hammer at Buttonville. Russell Burr is going out of the milk-producing business and is offering for sale the 40 registered Jerseys of the herd of Cline Burr and

This herd was started by Cline Burr in 1919 with a few head purchased from Alf Bagg, known throughout Canada for his fine

As Mr. Burr's sons reached maturity and joined their father in operating the farm, additions were made to the herd, until at the time of his death at the age of 95, five and a half years ago, the herd was well known as one of the best in the county.

In recent years the Burrs have used the artificial insemination service of the United Cattle Breeders at Brampton to maintain the excellence of their herd.

The young herd being offered for sale today is composed of fresh cows, springers, bred and open heifers, with high test and production, In 1965 Kittie Basil Ruth was awarded the president's cup by the Jersey Association for having produced the most milk of any living cow. Her record was a total of 168,-831 lbs. of milk and 7,970
