What's Cooking?

Almost everyone has a special dish which family or friends enjoy—why not share the recipe with our readers, be it main course, dessert or snack? Each week one will be published in this column—how about yours?

CHEESE WAFERS
These crisp cheese wafers are easy to prepare and if stored in a metal box in a cool place, will keep for months. Serve hot or cold.

1 cup grated strong Cheddar
1 cup crushed potato chips
1/4 cup soft butter
2 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1 tsp. prepared mustard

Measure cheese and chips after grating or crushing. Place in bowl with remaining ingredients and blend. Place on unbuttered baking sheet in small spoonfuls, flattening slightly with spoon bottom. Bake at 375 degrees for 5-8 minutes or until golden brown, then cool on rack. To serve hot, reheat at 300 for a few minutes. Yield: 2-3 dozen.
