IN THE VILLAGE OF MAPLE

Kleinburg All Set To Entertain Thousands At Binder Twine Fete

This Saturday brings the Kleinburg Binder Twine Festival, an all-day event, which attracts thousands of visitors. Designed as an old-fashioned gala country occasion, the festival was revived in 1967 as a Centennial event and was such a success and proved so popular that it now has become an annual fete, again.

On July 18, 1930 the Toronto Mail and Empire reported: "The celebration of the traditional 'binder twine night', established by Charlie Shaw more than 40 years ago, brought more than 5,000 persons to the village. Each year since the advent of the automobile into the farmers' lives the event has gradually increased in proportions, and this year was no exception, with the large crowd overflowing into the main streets."

"Originally the farmers came to the village to secure supplies of binder twine but the custom was soon changed into a time for a get-together. For many years now, Mr. Shaw, who supplies the twine to the farmers, has kept the celebration alive and with his sons (the late Earl of Kleinburg; Bill, now of Toronto; and Carl of RR 1, Kleinburg) has directed and supervised the celebration. "The party broke up shortly after midnight after the street dancing for which two brass bands had been provided."

In the revived festival entertainment goes on all day. Dancing will be enjoyed to the famous Moxie Whitney Orchestra from the Royal York Hotel, with spot dances and prizes included. Murray Morrison and his square dancers and Irish dancers will delight the toe-tapping group. Bands, clowns, jugglers, magicians and the award-winning barbershoppers who will show you what good old-fashioned harmonizing sounds like will be there. The Museum, with Bill Corcoran of Nashville as manager, will play for teenage dancers. Johnny Wayne, Frank Shuster and Fred Davis headline the guest list. Games of chance, pony rides, candy floss and corn on the cob will be available. A draw on a snowmobile and trailer and a quilt raffle will be held. Homemade candy, jams and jellies and binder twine souvenirs will be on sale.

A special laymen's service will be the order of the morning on October 18, while Rev. Ralph William, former minister

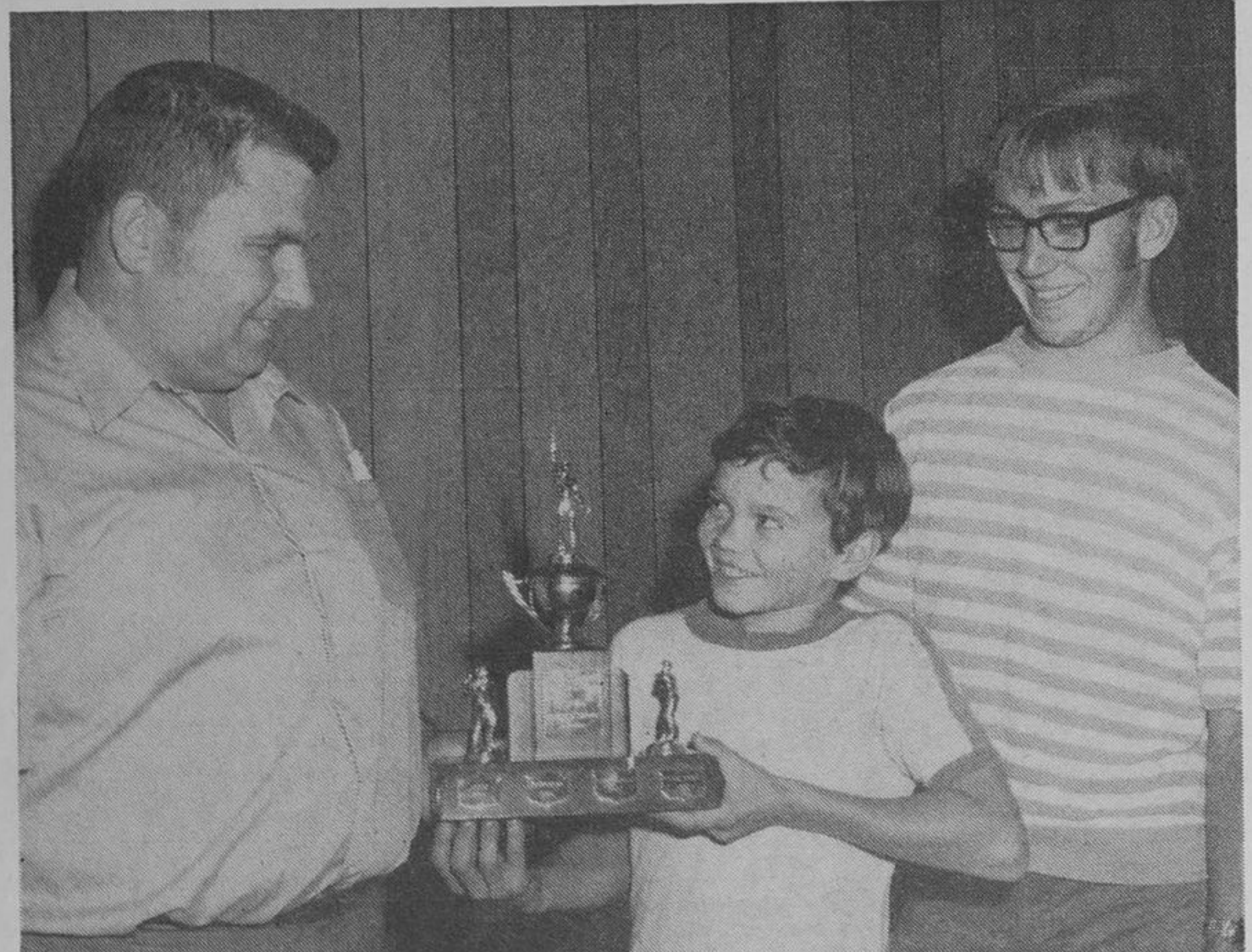
of the church, will return from his present post in Smithville for the service. There will be music of a more modern nature provided that evening by Organist Mrs. William Thurston.
