**Memorable Trip To Cyprus And Israel**

Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Brown of Centre Street West have recently returned from a trip to the Middle East, where they visited their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. James French and three grandchildren, in Nicosia, Cyprus. They stopped overnight in Rome and visited the Villa D'Este in Tivoli, with its beautiful gardens and fountains, before continuing to Cyprus.

After a few days in Cyprus, they were able to fly to Tel Aviv in Israel, where a two-day trip was enjoyed to Jerusalem. There, they were guided to historic points of interest, including the Omar Mosque, on the original site of Solomon's Temple. It is now held by the Moslems and visitors are only allowed in the courtyard. An enlightening walk through the Damascus Gate took tourists to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre and to the Walling Wall, going along the Via Dolorosa, stops were made at the eight stations of the Cross.

The final day of Israeli tours included visits to Nazareth, with its beautiful Church of Annunciation, Cana, Tiberias, Sea of Galilee and the excavating ruins of Capernaum. The site of the "Miracle of the Loaves and Fishes" was also pointed out by the guide.

Some indication of the development in Israel is shown by their progress — in increased agricultural production, vast construction work and reforestation.

Signs of enmity by adjoining countries were evident in military patrols and airforce planes along Israeli borders — over the Mediterranean and other areas. However, tourists were accorded very kind treatment.

After returning to Cyprus, they had a few more days with their family. A high point in their Cyprus visit was to see St. Hilarion Castle in the northern Kyrenia Range, also a trip to Salamis on the east coast was very interesting. There, crews were busy excavating in the ancient ruins. It was from Salamis, that Barnabas and Paul started on their missionary journey across Cyprus.

M. and Mrs. Brown returned home via London, England.

**What's Cooking?**  
Almost everyone has a special dish which family or friends enjoy — why not share the recipe with our readers, be it main course, dessert or snack? Each week one will be published in this column — how about yours?

**CONTINENTAL APPLE CAKE**

2 cups flour  
2 cup butter  
1 egg yolks  
2 tsp. sugar  
Juice and rind of 1 lemon  
Dry bread crumbs  
4 apples, thinly sliced  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 cup raisins  
1 tsp. cinnamon.

Mix flour, butter, egg yolk and 2 tsp. sugar together. Knead with hands. Add lemon juice and grated rind. When well blended and smooth, chill for several hours. Roll 1/4 inch thick. Divide in two parts and line a greased oblong tin with half the dough. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Add filling. Cover with more dough.

Brush with egg white and bake in a 350 degree oven for 40 to 50 minutes or until apples are tender. Dust with powdered sugar and cut in squares.

Serve hot or cold with whipped cream. Serves six.
