Vaughan Township Council, at its September 8 meeting, approved spending \$4,000 on testing the Carrville and Uplands Wells and the water in the Upland Well to determine the required treatment.

Meeting in committee August 24 council instructed the township engineer to contact International Water Supply for a report dealing with the capacities and cost of development of the Uplands Well. Representatives of International Water Supply reported the original design for Uplands Well was 350 gallons per minute or 500,000 gallons per day. However, because of the installation of Carrville Well 2, repeat testings should be made for comparison purposes.

The approved expenditure will enable the company to give a report on the full development of the Uplands Well and treatment for the elimination of the contaminants in the water supply.




