This decision was based upon a maximum sale price of \$5 each and that 100 books will be retained by the township for distribution to visiting

This quotation included editorial supervisory service, but not indexing which was estimated at an additional \$1,000. Additional copies will cost \$250 per 100. mit him to continue further. The folklore society continued to try to publish the whole history of the township but, because of limited funds and inability to secure the services of a competent writer, finally decided not to pursue the undertaking further.

However an anonymous interested person continued to search for a writer who could and would finish the task. He was successful in persuading Dr. Elmore Reaman, a retired university professor who was born, raised and educated in the township and was the author of several volumes, to compile and write the history. The anonymous person also provided remuneration for Dr. Reaman and his ex-

Following the death of Dr. Reaman, the historical society was organized early this year and appointed a committee to review the content of the history as written by Dr. Rea-

man. During recent months they have made numerous corrections and have rewritten portions for clarity. The manuscript, an accumulation of interesting detail respecting the early settlement of the township is ready. The committee reports that a large part of this history has been gleaned from the Tweedsmuir Histories compiled by branches of the Women's Institute located in the Township of Vaughan.


