COMMISSIONER OF ENGINEERING - to act as Chief Engineer for the Regional Municipality and assume responsibility for operation of the regional road system, regional waterworks system, regional sewage works, traffic engineering, regional vehicle and equipment depot and the management and administration of all property under jurisdiction of the Regional Council.

Qualifications: Registration as a Professional Engineer - Civil Branch in the Association of Professional Engineers of Ontario with extensive experience in municipal engineering at a senior level.

COMMISSIONER OF PLANNING - to direct planning operations in the joint planning area of York, to be responsible for preparation of maps, drawings, texts, statistical information and all other material necessary for the study, explanation and solution of problems or matters affecting the development of the York planning area; to hold public meetings when necessary and consult with Regional Council, Councils of area municipalities, planning committees and any local boards having jurisdiction within the Planning Area; shall assist Council in the preparation and adoption of an Official Plan.
