Royal Orchard has four portable classrooms. With the construction of the new school Royal Orchard would become a senior public school for grades 7 and 8 only, and the kindergarten to grade 6 pupils now at Royal Orchard would be transferred to Baythorn, while grade 7 and 8 students from east of the rail line (the new school area) will go to Royal Orchard.

Population projections for this fast-growing area indicate that such a distribution would make it necessary to locate six portables at Baythorn by September, 1972. The division of planning and development, headed by Stephen Bacsalmasi, recommended therefore, that Baythorn go to grade 5 only, and that until another school is built in the Royal Orchard area, the grade 6 pupils be moved to Royal Orchard.
