Bad Cheque Artist Nabbed At Local Canadian Tire - Out On \$500 Bail

Arrested for passing a \$300 bad cheque at the Canadian Tire Corporation Associate Store, 70 Yonge Street North in Richmond Hill, a Toronto man was remanded on \$500 cash or property bail Monday in Richmond Hill Provincial Court.
 Crown Attorney John Apple-gath said Donald Morrison, alias Petersen, was wanted for passing 11 cheques in British Columbia. He recommended bail of \$1,000, but Provincial Judge Maurice Charles chose the lower amount.
 Markham Township Police report three youths were arrested at 2:50 am Sunday for attempted burglary at the Fina Service Station, Highway 48 and 14th Avenue.
 Vaughan Township Police September 25 arrested two men for stealing scrap metal from a residence on Concession 7.
 Vaughan Police also caught and charged four male juveniles with slashing the tire of an automobile parked in a driveway on Scott Drive, Richvale, September 27.

 The auxiliary is also asking farmers and gardeners to donate fresh produce — pumpkins, squash, apples, turnips, gourds and anything else edible and saleable.
 The sale will continue from 10 am to 4 pm, with Auctioneer Bill Walker holding forth from 10 am to 12 noon. For pick-up of rummage in the Richmond Hill area, donors are asked to call 884-3516 after 4:30 pm.
 Union Villa Administrator Cal Peppier was guest speaker at the meeting. The new residence for senior citizens is welcoming its first guests this month, and Mr. Peppier introduced some of his staff members to the auxiliary.
 Mrs. Alice Born and Mrs. Joan Crist are in charge of the office. Mrs. Marjorie Fontaine is nursing supervisor and Mrs. Phyllis Oliver is the food supervisor.
 Mrs. Miriam Lewis, the arts and crafts director, displayed samples of crafts. The decoupage work and miniature furniture considered items the residents might enjoy making.
 Two hand lettered mottos made and framed by Auxiliary Member Mrs. Kathleen Weyman were presented to Mr. Peppier and his staff by President Mrs. Beryl Lunney.

Speaking of future plans, Mr. Peppier said there is an organ and a piano already at the Villa so the residents can enjoy sing-songs. Mrs. Lunney and Mrs. Gladys Kennedy, both talented musicians, were urged to conduct sing-songs.
