What's Cooking? Almost everyone has a special dish which family or friends enjoy - why not share the recipe with our readers, be it main course, dessert or snack? Each week one will be published in this column - how about yours? LAMB PILAF 1 lb. rice 2 pints stock or water 1 oz. sugar 1 tsp. black pepper 1/2 lb. lamb 3 medium onions (chopped finely) 4 oz. fat 1 large tomato 1 dessertspoonful salt 2 ozs. pine nuts (or any available) 2 ozs. currants Chopped sage and parsley 1/2 tsp. mixed spice Melt fat in a saucepan, cut lamb in strips and lightly fry. Drain off but keep hot. In some fat, fry chopped onion, but do not brown. Add nuts, the rice; fry further 5 minutes, stirring continuously to prevent sticking. Add seasonings, currants, chopped tomato and stock. Stir again and cook very gently covered with a cloth as well as the lid until liquid is absorbed. Return the lamb, add chopped sage and parsley. Recover and allow to stand in warm place without further cooking for 15-20 minutes. Mrs. Tina McCartney.
