Black Creek Pioneer Village is located at Jane Street and Steeles Avenue West. It is open daily and on weekends. Also of interest this Sunday

are conducted hikes in five of the conservation areas. hikes are being held at 2 pm and 3.30 pm at Albion Hills, five miles north of Bolton on Highway 50; Bruce's Mill, two miles east of Don Mills Road on the Gormley Road in Markham Township and the Boyd Area, just north of Woodbridge on the Woodbridge-Kleinburg Road. There will also be conducted hikes on Sunday at the Greenwood Area, four miles north of Pickering on the Greenwood Road, at 2 pm, and at the Claremont Area, in Pickering Township, 11/2 miles north of Highway 7 on Sideoad 10 at 4 pm.

Visitors to the Albion Hills Area are also invited to visit the Albion House, a pre-Confederation log house. Tours are continuous all day Satur-


