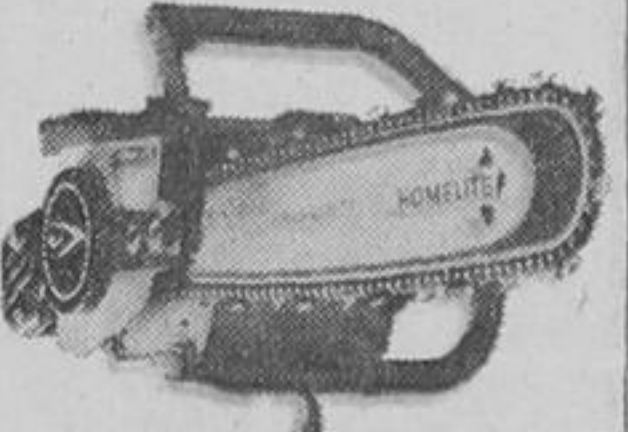

The standings are now as follows: Terry Bears 20, Ponies 19, Pussy Cats 14, Chipmunks 13, Poodles 11 and Beavers 7.

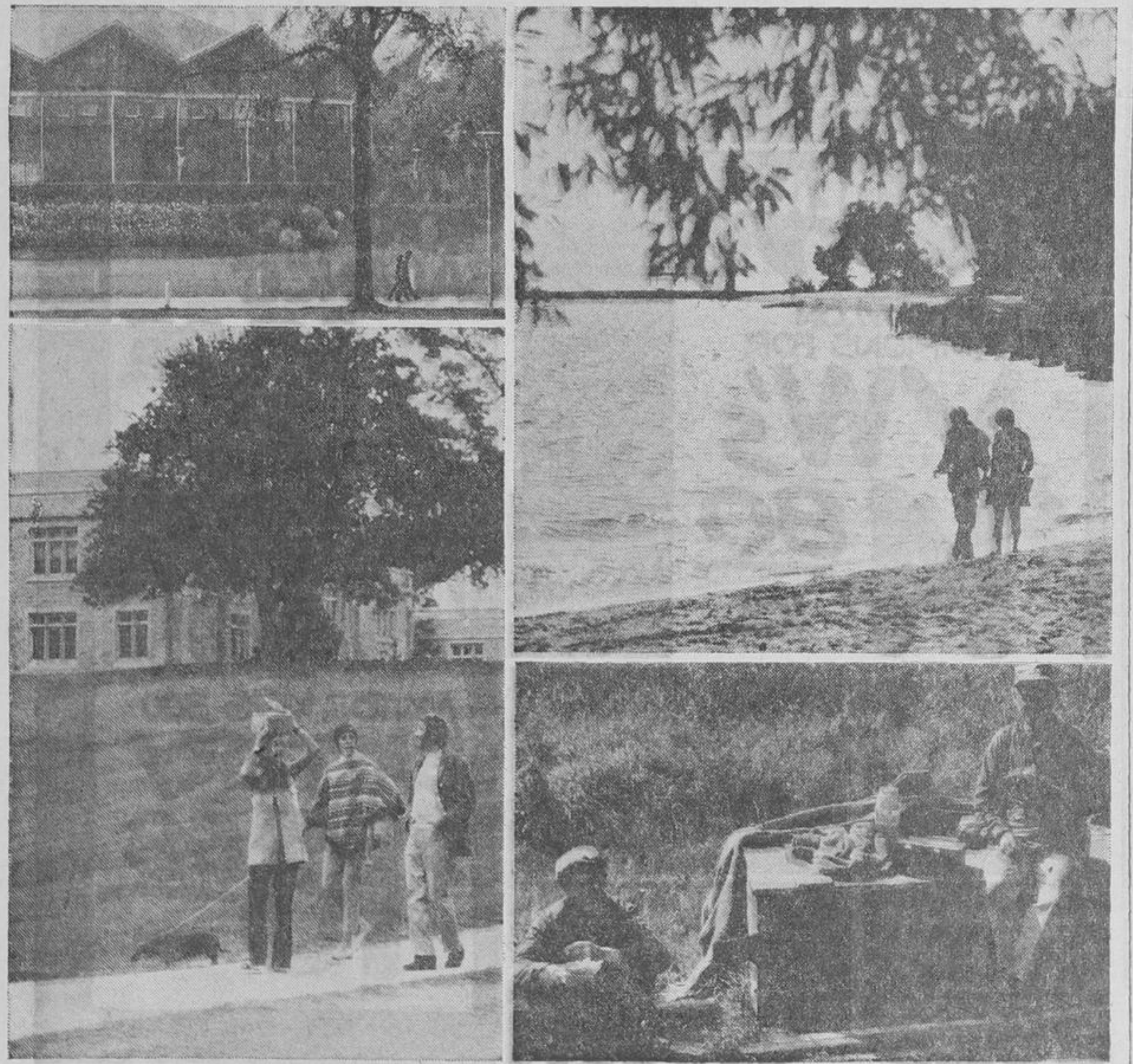
