Participating children were given instruction on water safety for 14 half-hour periods from June 8 to 19; three periods in class room instruction then ten periods inpool instruction followed by one period of classroom instruction to complete the

project. The cost of the project was shared by the parents and by the board with parents paying \$2 per pupil and the

board paying up to \$3 a pupil. In a report presented to a meeting of the board on October 13, Superintendent of Special Education and Student Services Maynard Hallman told trustees that there were 975 children in the classes involved and 941 par-
