WHITBY — In a brief on the Oshawa Area Planning and Development Study, Whitby council bitterly attacked Oshawa's charge that it may be under-represented and over-charged in regional government.

The brief presented to a discussion meeting October 20 strongly opposed the demand for representation by population made in Oshawa's presentation the previous week. The Whitby brief charged that the third discussion paper gave the city too much representation rather than to little.

Oshawa said it would pay \$9.25 million toward regional roads by 1976, but only \$2 million of this would be spent in the city. It said Whitby would pay \$2.2 million in the same period and would receive \$5.9 million in work.

The Whitby brief said this would be offset by construction of an \$18 million north-south expressway within Oshawa's west boundary. It said also that the city's regional road payments would be offset by the region picking up Oshawa's debts for arterial roads it has debentured.

The sacred concert sponsored by the Canadian Bible Society under the capable leadership of their dynamic secretary, Rev. Andrew Brndjar, Sunday evening, was one of the outstanding events of the year in Maple.

It brought to a successful climax, the month of stirring celebrations which marked 100 years of Christian service by the pioneer Wesleyan Methodists and the United Church of Canada.

The concert was happily ecumenical, with Rev. Norman Boegers, giving to call to worship and voicing a welcome to the citizens of Maple.

Dr. Ramsay Armitage, minister of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, was the chairman.

Rev. John Arbuckle of Zion Lutheran read the Scripture lesson. Rev. B. F. Andrew of St. Andrew's Presbyterian pronounced the benediction.

Mrs. Earl Hansen, of the Christian Missionary Alliance, was, above all, responsible for organizing an excellent program.

Next time the Bible society plans a sacred concert, it will be jammed to the roof. This time there was a splendid company of loyal friends and supporters of the Bible society from all the churches in Maple.

It should mark a new beginning of interest and support for a society which has as its one objective, the publication of Holy Scripture in all the languages of the world. It began in 1804 in Old London with its very first translation for Canada, a free gift to the Canadian Mohawk Indians, and now publishes Holy Scripture in more than 1,000 tongues.

The concert was magnificently varied throughout, with Bruce Dow, in his lovely tenor voice, singing negro spirituals. Dixie Dean, whose name is known throughout America, gave a program of accordion music.

The young people had a prominent place in the program. The famous "End Time Singers" with their vigorous and distinctive Christian message and the "Canadian Sound" with their telling witness. Thanks for the splendid program are also due to Mrs. William Knapp, organist and Mrs. Bruce Dow, pianist and to Earl Hansen and William Geen, who head up the local executive of the society. It was a memorable evening.

Senior Citizens The seniors have planned a trip to the McLaughlin Planetarium November 3, with a report to follow next week.

The program for November 9 is being planned with Remembrance Day in mind.

On October 26, Mrs. Edna Bryan presented a program of beautiful slides that she and her husband Barney had taken last summer when they travelled on a conducted tour through Europe climaxed with the Passion Play at Oberammergau in Bavaria. The scenery and views of castles were magnificent, and as usual, Mrs. Bryan's commentary, assisted by Barney, made the afternoon.

Some interesting facts have come to our attention about the Passion Play, including the fact that there are many around the world in Roman Catholic countries on Good Friday.

It seems that religious plays were quite common during the middle Ages and as early as the 13th century were widespread in many parts of Germany. In 1633, the Village of Oberammergau was afflicted by a severe epidemic of the plague, and the town council vowed to give a solemn presentation of the Passion and Death of Jesus every 10 years to the end of time if the people of their village were spared. The story goes that from then on the villagers recovered and the vow was carried out the very next year and every ten years thereafter.

During the years, several plays have had to be suspended due to political influence and wartime. In 1950 the play attracted half a million spectators. More have attended each year, until from the original single performance, in 1950 the play was presented 83 times.

The season is from May till September, with the performance beginning 8:30 in the morning and lasting until 6 in the evening.

There are 125 parts in the play as well as those of singers, soloists, the chorus and silent roles.

The original play took place in the church, and then was moved out into the open, and finally in 1815 a theatre was constructed, and reconstructed again in 1930. The stage itself is most impressive, with the chorus on a two plane stage at the front and the action at the rear on the second plane.

There is no artificial lighting, and the play takes place in daylight with the mountains, sky and clouds as backdrop, and the scenery changes, 40 in all, are carried out electrically. The table used for the Last Supper is more than 200 years old and some of the costumes as well as the two crosses used could be well considered museum pieces.

Although the actual text of the play goes back to the 16th century, it has been re-worked several times, and the music was written in the early 19th century by Oberammergau musician.

This would seem to be a most memorable event for one to be fortunate enough to attend, one never forgotten.
