She agrees with the present trustees that schools should be put to the fullest possible use for the benefit of all the people. The classroom, however, should be the prime concern of the board, declares Mrs. Coburn. Meanwhile she is attending every meeting of the board so that she will know as much as possible about its operations when the new board takes over in January.

Mrs. Coburn is one of two trustees representing the Township of King. In the October 5 election she headed the polls in a three-way battle, receiving 1,496 votes. Trustee Marvin Hunter was re-elected with 1.277 votes, and Trustee David Bachly with 1,031 votes lost his bid for re-election.

There will be four other women on the 18-member board in January. Richmond Hill Trustee Deena Simpson and Markham Trustee Louise Aimone and Merna Colbourne were all re-elected, and Mrs. Marianne Gillan of Sutton picked up the seat vacated by Trustee Les Burrows. Mr. Burrows did not stand for re-elec-


