Markham Farm Hit By Cattle Rustlers

Cattle rustlers are suspected in the disappearance of seven heifers from a Bayview Avenue farm just north of Richmond Hill.

And the hopes of a Richmond Hill family with seven children for their own home have received a setback.

The cows were valued at \$350 each, for a total of \$2,450.

Gone also is the gate for the gas line entrance at the Collins farm, north of the Enderman Nursery, a location where the cattle could easily have been loaded on a truck.

Markham Township Police are investigating. The heifers disappeared about two weeks ago, and it is now just about certain that they didn't just wander away.

Included are five Holsteins, one Hereford and one with a black and white face. They were insured against theft.

They were owned by Harry Brock of 99 Oxford Street, Richmond Hill. He rents the Collins farm and the family home in town. He started raising cattle two years ago to build up a nest egg to buy a home.

The lost cattle were bred to a purebred bull, and Mr. Brock would much rather have the heifers and their future calves than the insurance money.

The Brocks recently were also burglary victims. Police retrieved some guns stolen by the burglars, but a collection of coins wasn't found.

grey cash box hidden under papers and made off with it. Inside was about \$360 in cash and cheques.

Other drawers in the office were forced open and papers were scattered on the parts department floor.

Entry was gained by means of a ladder to an upstairs window.

Dr. Owen Slingerland To Be Head Of York Region Health, Welfare

The director of the present York County Health Unit today (Thursday) will be appointed York Regional Commissioner of Health and Social Services, the region council indicated at its last meeting, held November 12. The salary is to be \$29,500 per year.

Dr. Owen Slingerland was one of two applicants who answered the advertisements for the job.

The regional council health and social services committee decided not to bother interviewing the second applicant after receiving his submission.

The health and social services committee includes the following: Georgina Mayor, Dr. George Burrows, chairman, Richmond Hill Mayor William Lazenby, vice-chairman; Newmarket Mayor Robert Forhan; Whitchurch-Stouffville Mayor Kenneth Laushway; and King Mayor Kenneth MacLaggart.

Dr. Slingerland's present salary is \$23,000 per year, council was told.

Richmond Hill Councillor Donald Plaxton questioned the recommended salary.

Charge Sutton Teacher With Slapping Student

A charge of common assault has been laid against a teacher of Sutton District High School following a corridor fracas with a student last week.

The parents of Jo-Anne McAllister, 16, claim a teacher hit her in the mouth during a dispute over use of a washroom between classes.

They have run into a snag, however.

The girl and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard McAllister, were told by part-time Justice of the Peace Michael Gillen that the charge was in effect and would be heard in Newmarket Provincial Court December 8.

However, due to illness, Mr. Gillen was not able to complete the necessary paperwork, and two other justices of the peace refused to handle the affair since the information had first been taken and signed by another justice of the peace.

Sitting Justice of the Peace Norman Kelly of Newmarket said, however, that the procedure taken by the girl constitutes a charge providing she is willing to swear any information and the justice of the peace is satisfied an offence did take place.

Town Council Will Not Object To OMB Hearing Assessment Appeal

Richmond Hill Council unanimously accepted a motion November 16 by Councillors Eric George and Lois Hancey that it will not object to a hearing on an assessment appeal by the Municipal Board.

The appeal is entered by Lenall Property Limited, who own 320 Newkirk Road, which houses Brodie Industries Ltd., and filed an appeal in respect of the 1969 assessment.

This appeal was heard by the court of revision which confirmed the assessment. The firm then filed an appeal with the county court judge and the hearing was set for September 16, 1970.

A day or two before this date, Larry Brodie, the company's principal who was slated to present evidence, suffered a heart attack and was hospitalized. At the hearing his counsel, Fred Wood, of Mendelson, Beatty and Wood, 101 Richmond Street West, Toronto, requested an adjournment, and filed a medical certificate attesting to Mr. Brodie's confinement in hospital.

The county court judge was reluctant to grant an adjournment as such action would have required a special sitting. Accordingly, he refused on the understanding that the appellant would appeal to the OMB. The counsel then advised the court he had no evidence to offer.

An appeal was then made to the OMB and on October 15, without notice to the appellant or his counsel, the OMB issued an order dismissing the appellant's appeal because of lack of jurisdiction — because the appellant did not appear before the county court judge.

The OMB has since, according to Mr. Wood, said it will be content to grant a review of this matter, providing consent of the town is obtained.

The feeling of council was summed up by Councillor Hancey, who said, "I wouldn't like to think that because a man is seriously ill, he can't get a fair hearing, since Minister of Municipal Affairs Darcy McKeough has promised that every one will have the opportunity for a fair hearing. I think this incident might be drawn to his attention."

Child Aged 2 Dies When Crushed Under Wheels Of Garbage Truck

Two-year-old Blair James Philip of 378 Osiris Drive, Richmond Hill died under the wheels of a garbage truck in front of his home at about 10:15 am Thursday, November 19.

He was the son of seven-year-old Richmond Hill residents Glen and Jane Philip.

Surviving are two sisters, Kim aged six and Deanne aged four.

The coroner is Dr. Bernard Granton and an inquest is expected to be held. Deputy Police Chief Joseph Rainey told "The Liberal".

Driver of the York Sanitation Limited truck was Eric Wright of Bathurst Street North (RR 2), Newmarket.

He told police he got out of the truck to load some garbage moved the truck ahead, and found the child when he got out again.
