Last Saturday the second night of operation for the "Purple Pickle," Richmond Hill's first drop-in coffee house, was a great success, with more than 150 teenagers continually cramming the limited space of OMNI Hall to hear the rock group "Sykes".

The early success of this outreach program has added to the headaches of the already overcrowded OMNI OBLI workers, but they are committed to carry on this drop-in until the end of 1970 when it will be reviewed for continuance into 1971.

A most healthy sign this week was the unsolicited assistance from the visiting teens when cleanup time came round. Many of the visitors pitched in storing tables and chairs and sweeping floors.

The newly formed "Sykes", a local musical group, entertained all evening to the satisfaction of the young critics and have been assured of future work by the "Purple Pickle" when the new year rolls around.

Tentative plans call for a New Year's Day dance, a sort of "Start the Year Right Bash," which will be held January 1.

The young committee of the "Purple Pickle" has been working quite hard in lining up volunteer adults to visit each week-end to keep the program on an even keel. This week's visitors were Mr. and Mrs. Len Pugh, Mrs. Warren Hodgins and John Bork.

The "Purple Pickle" people will be meeting this Wednesday night at the OMNI Hall to form an operating committee and all young bloods interested are welcome to attend.

The older members of the OMNI OBLI are well into their rehearsals of "Alice in Wonderland" slated for December 17, 18 and 19, in aid of the Family Counselling Service. Publicity photos of the cast were taken this week and plans are well underway to complete the advertising posters which will be appearing about town. Tickets will go on sale December 4.

Two new topical skits have been dealing with advertising and quick sales programs. Chris Cameron, Brent King and Joe Durand will be responsible for these vignettes. Bob Hargreaves' "Minister" has been expanded to incorporate a "Study of Churchgoers," a humorous look at the people in the pews.

The production needs at least one big tree at centre stage and John Stephenson has been attempting to secure one from local drama groups. However, it seems that no stage tree grows in Richmond Hill.

Although the three night production is specifically for the benefit of the "Family Counselling Service," future presentations may be arranged for service clubs, or organizations who wish to use this young cast as a means to raise funds for other causes. The entire show, or portions of it, is available to local clubs during January and February.

Learning Disorders Topic Of TV Program

A special education teacher with the York County Roman Catholic School Board, Miss Marilu Miller, will appear with Dr. Lynn Trainor, chairman of the North York Board of Education and other educational authorities on a program on "Learning Disorders" on the new educational television Channel 19 presentation of "Chalkdust" next week.

Each Chalkdust program is telecast four times weekly — on Channel 19 at 7 p.m. Tuesday and 3:50 p.m. Thursday, and on Toronto's Channel 6 at 9 a.m. Saturday. The CBC-TV network carries the program Sundays across the country.

On next week's program a mother describes some of the functions of parents who have children with learning disorders, and Professor Harry Silverman, one of a panel of experts argues that the means of recognizing learning disorders and determining the success or failure of treatment are still inadequate.

Other panelists include Mrs. Marjorie King, executive secretary of the Commission for Emotional and Learning Disabilities in Children, and Dr. Joan Bowers, Provincial Superintendent of Special Education, Department of Education.

The Chalkdust series brings together teachers, parents and students for frank discussion of the achievements and failures of education today.

Etobicoke Orchestra Concert This Friday

Conducting the Etobicoke Philharmonic Orchestra of 70 players this year is Harman Haakman of RR 2, Maple. This proficient orchestra is now putting the final touches to a program to be presented this Friday night in the Martingrove Collegiate at the corner of Richview and Martingrove Avenues in Etobicoke.

The program will consist of Schubert's Rosamunde Overture, the Symphony No. 5 of Tchaikovsky and the same composer's Violin Concerto in D Major with guest artist Adele Armin.

Miss Armin, who is a native of Etobicoke, will be playing a Guarnerius loaned to her by Leon Weinstein of Loblaw's. Earlier this year she won the CBC's Talent Festival.

Following the performance there will be a coffee party organized by the ladies' auxiliary at which time the public is invited to meet members of the orchestra.

Canada's Flowers Enrich W I Meeting

Members of Vellore Women's Institute had an opportunity to refresh their knowledge of Canada at their November meeting in Vellore Memorial Hall.

The response to the roll call was to name a Canadian province and its emblematic flower. Mrs. Ken Tilley enlarged on this by giving a description of the emblematic flowers of all Canadian Provinces and Territories, telling of the origin of names and showing colored print of the flowers and crests.

The motto for the meeting was "To accept a favor from a friend is to confer one."

Mr. Joe Snider told of a few human interest incidents in public relations, and to illustrate the motto read the story "Tom Morgan's Two-way Gift" which was published in Readers Digest.

The story concerns the experiences of a boy undergoing the controversial treatment called "patterning" for brain injury. It is the heart warming story of how the boy's family plea for help rallied a community.

Mrs. Floyd Diceman read a humorous poem, "My Wishing Machine," and conducted games. The ladies had a chance to test their artistic skills by making a sketch of "The neighbor sitting on your left."

Lunch was served and a social time enjoyed.

Parents Demand Return Of Bus For Catholic Pupils On Dead End Street

A delegation of parents from Briggs Avenue were not convinced when officials of York County Roman Catholic School Board told them it would be more hazardous to bus children off the street than it is to let them walk.

Spokesman for the group of six that appeared before the board on November 17 was John Pennyfather, a former trustee with the Richmond Hill Roman Catholic School Board.

A school bus picks up nine Roman Catholic children from the corner of Briggs and Bayview Avenues north of Highway 7 and takes them to St. Joseph's School in Richmond Hill, then returns them to the same intersection.

Briggs Avenue is a dead-end street running six-tenths of a mile east off Bayview Avenue. It has open ditches and no sidewalks, said Mr. Pennyfather and the speed limit is 50 miles an hour.

The former Richmond Hill Roman Catholic Board put a bus on Briggs Avenue in 1967, and the service continued to the end of October, 1970.

"This route was established by the previous board, and we were promised by the county board that it would continue," said Mr. Pennyfather. "You can do no less than put the bus back on."

Business Administrator Percy Laframboise pointed out that one reason the bus was put on in the first place was because a public school bus picking up children on Briggs Avenue was creating an additional hazard, but York County Board of Education discontinued the extension along Briggs Avenue in 1969, picking up the children from the area at the corner of Bayview and Briggs Avenue.

The only way a bus can turn around, explained Plant Supervisor Jack Matthews, is to back up and this is a hazardous procedure. Last February a bus doing this run was involved in an extensive property damage accident when it backed into a truck due to the lack of space in which to turn at the end of the street.

The only alternative, he added, would be to back the bus to the full length of the street onto Bayview Avenue. No Roman Catholic student has to walk more than half a mile to the corner, he declared.

Mr. Pennyfather told the board there are about 12 houses on the street, a feed store and a furniture store. Large trucks and farm machinery equipment are a serious hazard to pedestrians.

The parents argued that there is no place for the children to wait for the bus on Bayview Avenue other than the roadway or the soft shoulder. During the winter even the shoulder is eliminated by the snow plough, and in spring the filled drainage ditches along Briggs Avenue represent a serious hazard to young children.

In a printed statement, they added that the point at which the children would be required to wait is especially hazardous, that in October a car left the road and travelled through a ditch, finally smashing a fence, "its path carried it through the point where our children will be required to stand."

Mr. Matthews reported that on November 5 from 8:15 to 8:50 am nine cars travelled Briggs Avenue.

World Vision Aids Pakistan Flood Victims

An international organization supported by several hundred people throughout the district has this week been flying relief supplies to flood victims in East Pakistan.

World Vision International of Canada's Director, James Brown of Langstaff reported to "The Liberal" that 70,000 vitamin food packages, \$20,000 of special anti-biotics were on their way within days of the tragedy.

World Vision's representatives in the Far East gathered cholera vaccine in Hong Kong and Vietnam, where the organization has offices and warehouses, and are now on the spot in the flood area. By meeting the special requests received from the Canadian International Development Agency, the co-ordinator of the emergency flights from Trenton Air Force base, World Vision is able to avoid the sending of items presently unusable in Pakistan.

An urgent call for tetracycline tablets was received on Monday from the stricken area. On Tuesday World Vision had obtained twenty million of these from the Frank Horner Co. in Montreal with more to come from other manufacturers. To meet the emergency food needs the organization dispatched by air 2,000 special food kits, these were followed by 10,000 units of Kennedy Airport in New York on Wednesday.

The experience gained in twenty years of meeting overseas emergencies and its child-care program for over 32,000 children in twenty countries enables World Vision to move rapidly in meeting needs. It operates with others working on the disaster. During the next few days it will turn over to the Pakistan Canada Association over \$100,000 worth of clothing.

Mr. Brown stated that once the immediate material needs are met through the generosity of Canadian manufacturers, the need for financial aid on a people to people basis will be vital in rehabilitating the survivors. Donations can be sent to World Vision of Canada, 410 Consumers Road, Willowdale, income tax receipts will be provided.
