selection. The world's championships or "Olympics" of women's field hockey are held every four years. Canada will compete for the second time next summer in New Zealand.

Women's field hockey is in its infancy in Canada, but is a major sport in countries such as England, South Africa, Holland, Germany, Australia and

New Zealand. Following a 10-day training camp in Vancouver, the team will depart July 7, 1971, for an eight-week international tour which includes Japan, Australia,
