Only three tenders were received by Vaughan Works Committee for the supply of 5% inch crushed gravel or stone, type "B" for summer road maintenance, it was reported at town council's March 1 meeting.

Because of the location of the pits council decided to split the purchase of 30,000 tons between the three tenders and save on transportation charges.

Crawford-Ontario Sand & Gravel will supply crushed gravel from its Maple pit at \$1.60 per ton; Connor Sand & Gravel will supply crushed gravel at \$1.65 per ton from both its Highway 27 and Bolton pits and Indusium will supply crushed stone at \$1.95 ton from its Acton pit.

Council also awarded the contract for supply of 350,000 gallons of 22% calcium chloride brine solution for summer road maintenance to Vaughan Minerals, Keele St., Maple, at 7¢ per gallon. The only other tender was for 7.9¢ per gallon.

Supply of 10,000 gallons of RT 2 tar primer will be purchased from Royal Paving Ltd., bid was the lowest of three received. The highest was for Toronto, whose 24-¢ per gallon

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Hockey Teams Prefer Doublinlink To Cheaper Woodbridge Ice Time

Convenience of the ice surface seems to be preferred by Vaughan Township groups to cheaper ice time.

Vaughan Recreation Committee rents 40 hours per week of ice time at Doublinlink at \$30 per hour for hockey and \$20 per hour for figure skating. The time is divided between: Maple Minor Hockey 13½ hours, Maple Girls' Hockey one hour, Thornhill OMAHA nine hours, Thornhill Church League 13 hours, figure skating 3½ hours.

A subsidy of \$11 per hour is provided for each of the hockey leagues which in turn pays the recreation committee \$14 per hour. The \$5 difference is made up from gate receipts.

With the take over of the Village of Woodbridge and its assets at the first of this year, the new Town of Vaughan is responsible for the operation and maintenance of Woodbridge Arena. Therefore the township recreation committee felt that full utilization of the ice time there at \$10 to \$13 per hour and resultant reduction in ice time at Doublinlink could reduce to some extent the cost of its winter programs.

The recreation committee called a meeting of all groups to discuss the matter to discover that the Maple Minor Hockey and both Thornhill Hockey groups preferred to remain at Doublinlink even if it meant losing the \$11. per hour subsidy. The Vaughan skating club was dubious if it would be operating next season and the Woodbridge Minor Hockey was quite happy to remain in its home arena.

The committee, although very disappointed the subsidized groups did not appear willing to co-operate, recommended to council that they should be allowed to play hockey at the arena of their choice for the 1971-72 hockey season.

However, the committee pointed out that the Woodbridge Arena has better than average facilities and intends to rent them to outsiders, if local groups do not want to take advantage of the economical charge for ice time.

Teston United To Stay Put The relocation of Teston United Church to make way for the reconstruction of the Teston Sideroad and Jane Street intersection will not be necessary at present, Vaughan Town Council has learned.

Council has authorized Town Engineer Richard Kraft to begin negotiations for the relocation of the church on January 12, subject to approval of Highways Department.

After many hours of discussion with representatives of that body, it was learned the DHO did not consider the expense of moving the church warranted at this time. However, they did agree that, in order to protect the intersection, purchase of the required property on the northwest corner of Teston Sideroad and Jane Street would be acceptable.

The relocation of the church can then be accomplished at a later date when traffic flow increases sufficiently to warrant the reconstruction of the sideroad.

Council authorized Town Appraiser Ed Higgins to begin negotiations for this parcel of land and to obtain the necessary surveys immediately, at its March 1 meeting.
