Tony Dawson Of St. Andrew's Canadian Composers Too Obscure For Public Taste Says Musician

Twentieth Century Canadian composers are more concerned about pleasing themselves than they are about pleasing their audiences.

This, says Tony Dawson, music director at St. Andrew's College, Aurora is the main reason why box office falls off when a concert features a modern composer. The general public still prefers the works of composers of the 18th and 19th Centuries.

Mr. Dawson was speaking at a meeting of the York County University Women's Club at the college in Aurora on March 29.

Most people complain that the modern composer has no melody in his work, and thus the music is very obscure, Mr. Dawson continued. Some of the blame, he declared, lies with the composers who today have no particular desire to please the audience as did Bach or Beethoven. They would rather write for their own satisfaction.

They feel, too, that they must be original, an affliction that did not influence composers of the past.

There is also a greater variety of style in music - pop, jazz, 12-note or electronic, and the composer must search for the style that suits him best.

Despite all this Mr. Dawson feels there is a value and beauty in music written in Canada in the 20th century, and to demonstrate this, the program concluded with a presentation of contemporary Canadian music.

Soprano Doreen Hiltz sang two songs written by Oskar Morawetz in 1953. The first was Blake's poem, "Piping Down The Valleys Wild," and the second "Land Of Dreams" which is not typically 20th century.

Mr. Dawson's own composition, "Sonata For Flute and Piano" (1969) featured Karl Rohovsky on the flute. Mr. Dawson accompanied by Eileen Boreassa on the violin then

played the very complex "Andante" from the "Sonata For Violin and Piano" written in 1960 by Samuel Dolin.

With the violin again in accompaniment, the audience was treated to "Dance" from "Suite No. 2" written in 1952 by Patricia Blomfield.

Probably the most famous of all Canadian composers, Healey Willan, was also included. Doreen Hiltz sang his "To An Isle In The Water" based on a poem by Yates and written in 1926.

The evening finished with three songs from the "Fang Dynasty," written in 1949 by John Beckwith.
